Historical Perspective:

Senators Patty Murray & Maria Cantwell have sent a solicitation to local governments to communicate infrastructure needs to them via a prioritized list for earmarks in available money within the American Rescue Plan Act and a potential future transportation package. Initial projects have been submitted. Correspondence with office staff have indicated it would be helpful to have a Resolution of Support for grant acquisition efforts.

6. Stormwater: SW 10th Street Retrofit: \$219,451.98
7. Water: Well #3 Addition of a Generator and a Chlorinator: \$300,000
8. Wastewater: Citywide Sewer Lining Project: \$1.3 Million

Historical Perspective:

The Washington State Auditors office has completed the 2019 financial statement/accountability audit for the City. An audit is performed for each calendar year. In 2019 the city received Federal grants in excess of \$750,000. As a result, the auditors office was required to perform additional audit procedures related to the award of those funds.

Information for Consideration:

The audit exit conference has completed on March 15th, 2021. The City was issued an unmodified opinion on the fair presentation of the City's financial statements in accordance with its regulatory basis of accounting. Separately, the City was issued an adverse opinion on the fair presentation with regard to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) because the financial statements are prepared using a basis of accounting other than GAAP (Cash Basis). The auditors also presented the City with a list of audit recommendations. These do not appear as part of the audit but are given to the City for review and corrective action to be taken.

The audit in relation to the Federal Grant received, the auditors did not have a negative opinion, but they did issue a management letter. The issue related to the City's procurement policy and the lack of identified policies relating to Federal procurement requirements. This issue has been researched and an update to the financial policy has been prepared and reviewed by the Finance Committee and will be taken to council for approval.

Historical Perspective:

On March 11th, 2021 Governor Inslee announced the long awaited Phase III to the Healthy Washington Plan to begin on March 22nd, 2021. <https://www.governor.wa.gov/news-media/inslee-announces-statewide-move-phase-3-recovery-plan-return-spectator-events-and-phase> Also, the Federal government passed the American Rescue Plan.

Information for Consideration:

Phase III of the Healthy Washington Plan has several changes in it compared to earlier phases. Namely, reopening is done via a county-by-county methodology rather than region. All counties are going to Phase III. Counties will be evaluated bi-weekly. Counties can move up and down Phase level. Restaurants will be able to have indoor dining at 50%. Youth sports outside can have spectators at 25% capacity.

Also, the Federal legislature passed the American Rescue Plan Act with President Biden signing it on March 12th, 2021. The Act has \$1,400 stimulus payments to taxpayers within defined income limits and assistance for cities and other social service providers. The flier attached details the highlights.

Information for Consideration:

Key Bills of Interest:

- ESHB 1189 Tax Increment Financing (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/billssummary?Year=2021&BillNumber=1189>) Bill passed out of House and is in Senate. Scheduled to get referred out of Senate Committee on Business, Financial Services and Trade. This will allow Cities another method to fund infrastructure for redevelopment /future development.

- HB 1099 Growth Management Act Climate Change (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/billssummary?Year=2021&BillNumber=1099>) Bill voted out of the House. It is now in the Senate. Bill now has language that State will pick up some costs related to the climate change projects. Also, allows cities to meet greenhouse gas targets by allowing missing middle housing.

- E2SSB Concerning Affordable Housing Incentives (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/billssummary?Year=2021&BillNumber=5287>) This bill will allow for all cities to utilize Multifamily Housing Tax Exemption. Has crossed over from the Senate to the House.

- HB 1333 Extension of .09 monies (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/billssummary?BillNumber=1333&Year=2021&Initiative=false>) This bill has passed the House and is in the Senate. It would renew the .09 Sales and Use Tax for Economic Development for twenty years. Has made it to Senate Ways

and Means Committee.

- HB 1386 Modifying Property Tax Exemption for Value of New Construction for Industrial/Manufacturing Facilities (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/billssummary?BillNumber=1386&Initiative=false&Year=2021>) This bill has passed the House and is in the Senate at Ways and Means. This bill would authorize councilmanic exemption of property taxes for new industrial developments for any community if development will provide family living wage jobs of \$23 per hour and health benefits and have procurement preference for women, minority, and veteran-owned businesses. Prior bill only covered Pierce and King Counties.

- HB 1335 Racial Deed Restriction Bill (<https://app.leg.wa.gov/billssummary?BillNumber=1335&Initiative=false&Year=2021>) This bill would remove racial deed restrictions on property titles and deeds. The original bill put this cost solely on cities. The amended bill puts the cost on an appropriation through the Legislature. The Bill got voted out of the House and is in the Senate within the Business, Financial Services, and Trade Committee.

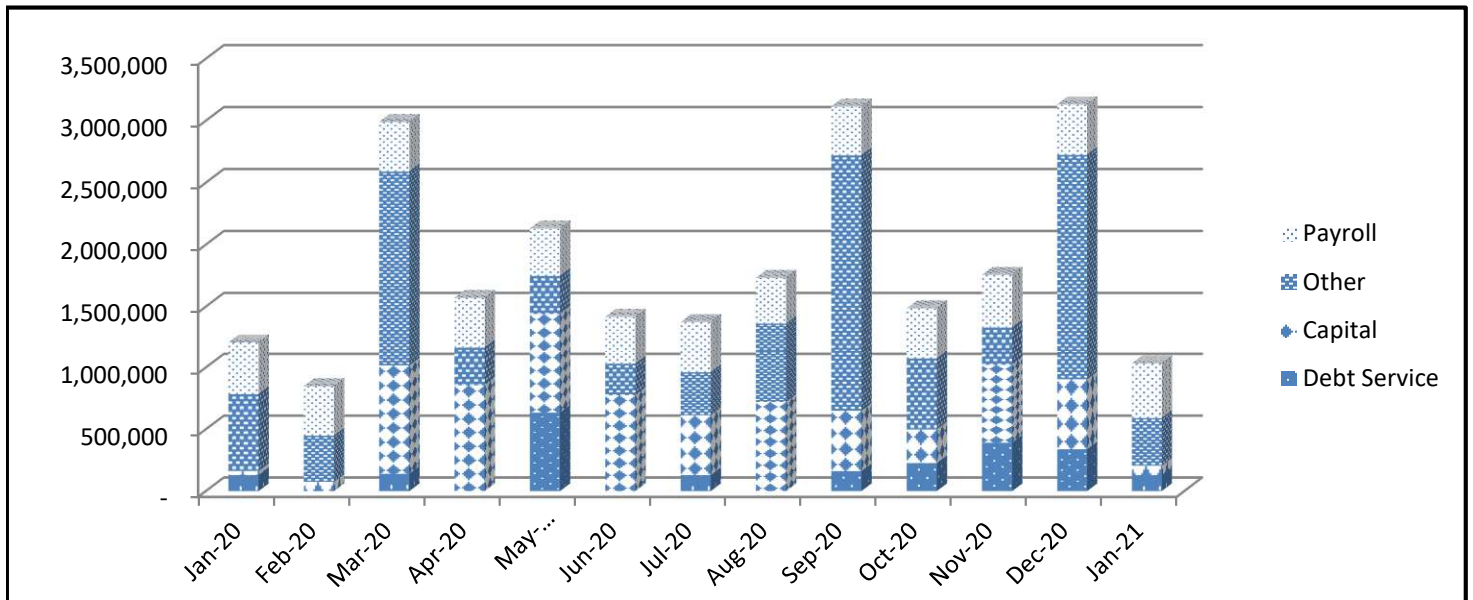

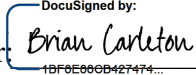

Bias-Based / Racial Profiling Report

2020



Bias-based policing is described as the inappropriate reliance on characteristics such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age cultural group, disability or affiliation with any non-criminal group as the basis for providing differing law enforcement service or enforcement.

According to state law ([RCW 43.101.410](#)), Local law enforcement agencies shall:

(1) Local law enforcement agencies shall comply with the recommendations of the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs regarding racial profiling, as set forth under (a) through (f) of this subsection. Local law enforcement agencies shall:

- (a) Adopt a written policy designed to condemn and prevent racial profiling;
- (b) Review and audit their existing procedures, practices, and training to ensure that they do not enable or foster the practice of racial profiling;
- (c) Continue training to address the issues related to racial profiling. Officers should be trained in how to better interact with persons they stop so that legitimate police actions are not misperceived as racial profiling;
- (d) Ensure that they have in place a citizen complaint review process that can adequately address instances of racial profiling. The process must be accessible to citizens and must be fair. Officers found to be engaged in racial profiling must be held accountable through the appropriate disciplinary procedures within each department;
- (e) Work with the minority groups in their community to appropriately address the issue of racial profiling; and
- (f) Within fiscal constraints, collect demographic data on traffic stops and analyze that data to ensure that racial profiling is not occurring.

(2) The Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs shall coordinate with the criminal justice training commission to ensure that issues related to racial profiling are addressed in basic law enforcement training and offered in regional training for in-service law enforcement officers at all levels.

(3) Local law enforcement agencies shall report all information required under this section to the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs.

Biased-Based Policing Policy

The College Place Police Department (CPPD) policy No. 402 establishes guidance for Biased Based Policing, member responsibilities, supervisor responsibilities, training and State reporting requirements. The purpose of this policy is to ensure the CPPD is committed to policing in a fair and objective manner to foster community trust.

Policy 402.2 - The CPPD is committed to providing law enforcement services to the community with due regard for the racial, cultural or other differences of those served. It is the policy of CPPD to provide law enforcement services and to enforce the law equally, fairly, objectively and without discrimination toward any individual or group.

According to Policy 401.4.1, while in the performance of their duties, officers contacting a person shall be prepared to articulate sufficient reason for the contact independent of the protected characteristics of the individual. Each time an officer makes a traffic stop, the officer shall report any demographic information required by CPPD.

Complaints

The CPPD maintains an in person or online complaint review process that adequately addresses complaints of racial profiling. Officers accused of racial profiling are held accountable through policy 1020; Personnel Complaints. This process thoroughly investigates any allegation of misconduct or improper job performance against any department employee that, if true, would constitute a violation of department policy, federal, state or local law.

Supervision and Review

Policy 402.5 states: Supervisors shall monitor those individuals under their command for any behavior that may conflict with the purpose of this policy and shall handle any alleged or observed violation of this policy in accordance with CPPD Policy 1020; Personnel Complaints.

Each year the Chief shall review available data related to traffic stops, including demographic data, existing procedures, practices and training, as well as complaints. The data will be analyzed for any patterns or other possible indicators of racial, or bias-based profiling and included in an annual report for the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (RCW 43.101.410).

Training

Training on fair and objective policing and review of the CPPD Bias-Based Policing and Profiling Policy will be conducted annually.

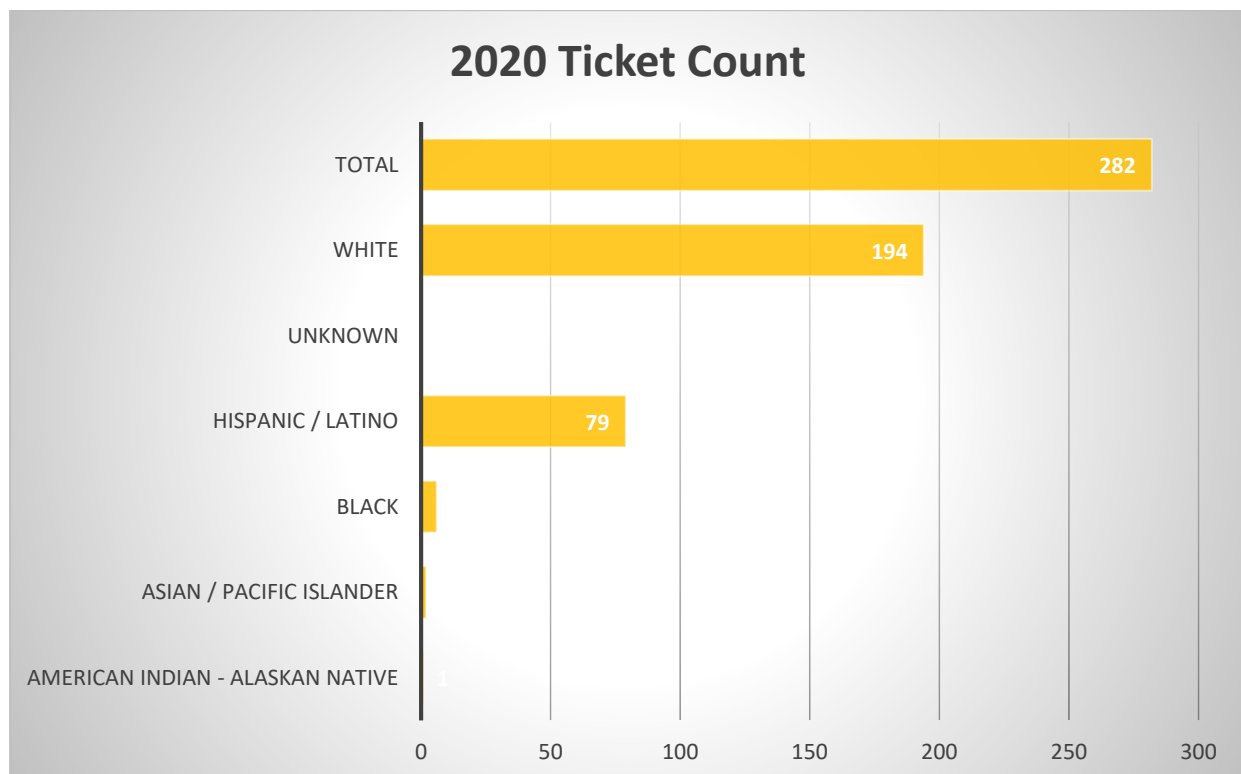

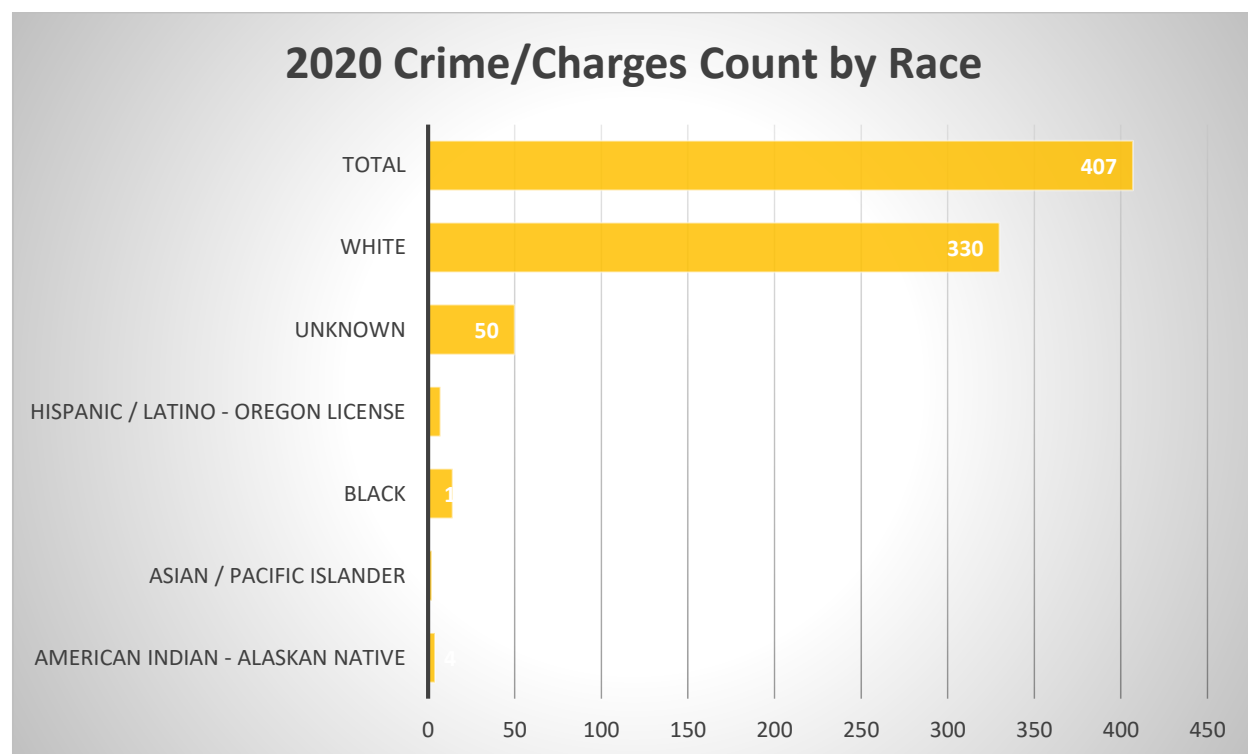

Washington State Law



- RCW 43.101.410 – Law Enforcement Agencies Shall:
 - (a) Adopt a written policy designed to condemn and prevent racial profiling;
 - (b) Review and audit their existing procedures, practices, and training to ensure that they do not enable or foster the practice of racial profiling;
 - (c) Continue training to address the issues related to racial profiling. Officers should be trained in how to better interact with persons they stop so that legitimate police actions are not misperceived as racial profiling;
 - (d) Ensure that they have in place a citizen complaint review process that can adequately address instances of racial profiling. The process must be accessible to citizens and must be fair. Officers found to be engaged in racial profiling must be held accountable through the appropriate disciplinary procedures within each department;
 - (e) Work with the minority groups in their community to appropriately address the issue of racial profiling; and
 - (f) Within fiscal constraints, collect demographic data on traffic stops and analyze that data to ensure that racial profiling is not occurring.

CPPD Lexipol Policy



- **Biased-Based Policing Policy**
- The College Place Police Department (CPPD) policy No. 402 establishes guidance for Biased Based Policing, member responsibilities, supervisor responsibilities, training and State reporting requirements. The purpose of this policy is to ensure the CPPD is committed to policing in a fair and objective manner to foster community trust.
- Policy 402.2 - The CPPD is committed to providing law enforcement services to the community with due regard for the racial, cultural or other differences of those served. It is the policy of CPPD to provide law enforcement services and to enforce the law equally, fairly, objectively and without discrimination toward any individual or group.
- According to Policy 401.4.1, while in the performance of their duties, officers contacting a person shall be prepared to articulate sufficient reason for the contact independent of the protected characteristics of the individual. Each time an officer makes a traffic stop, the officer shall report any demographic information required by CPPD.

Complaints



- The CPPD maintains an in person or online complaint review process that adequately addresses complaints of racial profiling. Officers accused of racial profiling are held accountable through policy 1020; Personnel Complaints. This process thoroughly investigates any allegation of misconduct or improper job performance against any department employee that, if true, would constitute a violation of department policy, federal, state or local law.

Supervision



- **Supervision and Review**

- Policy 402.5 states: Supervisors shall monitor those individuals under their command for any behavior that may conflict with the purpose of this policy and shall handle any alleged or observed violation of this policy in accordance with CPPD Policy 1020; Personnel Complaints.
- Each year the Chief shall review available data related to traffic stops, including demographic data, existing procedures, practices and training, as well as complaints. The data will be analyzed for any patterns or other possible indicators of racial, or bias-based profiling and included in an annual report for the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (RCW 43.101.410).

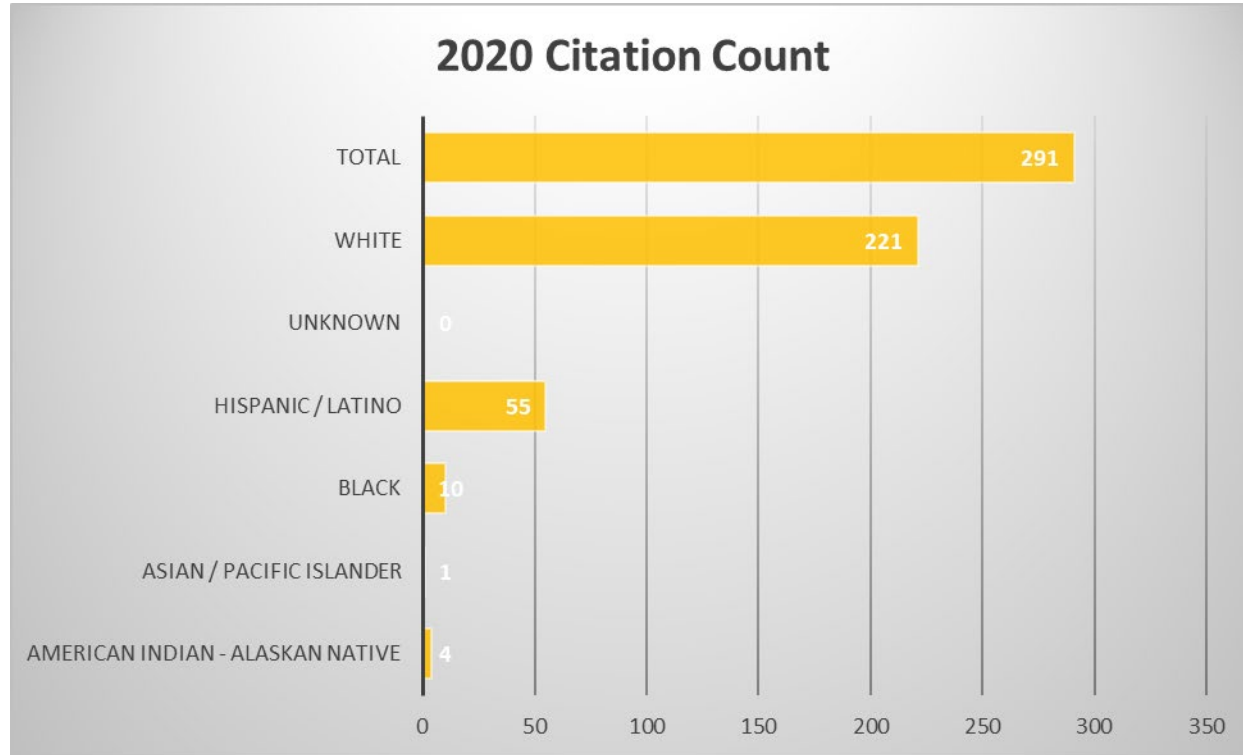

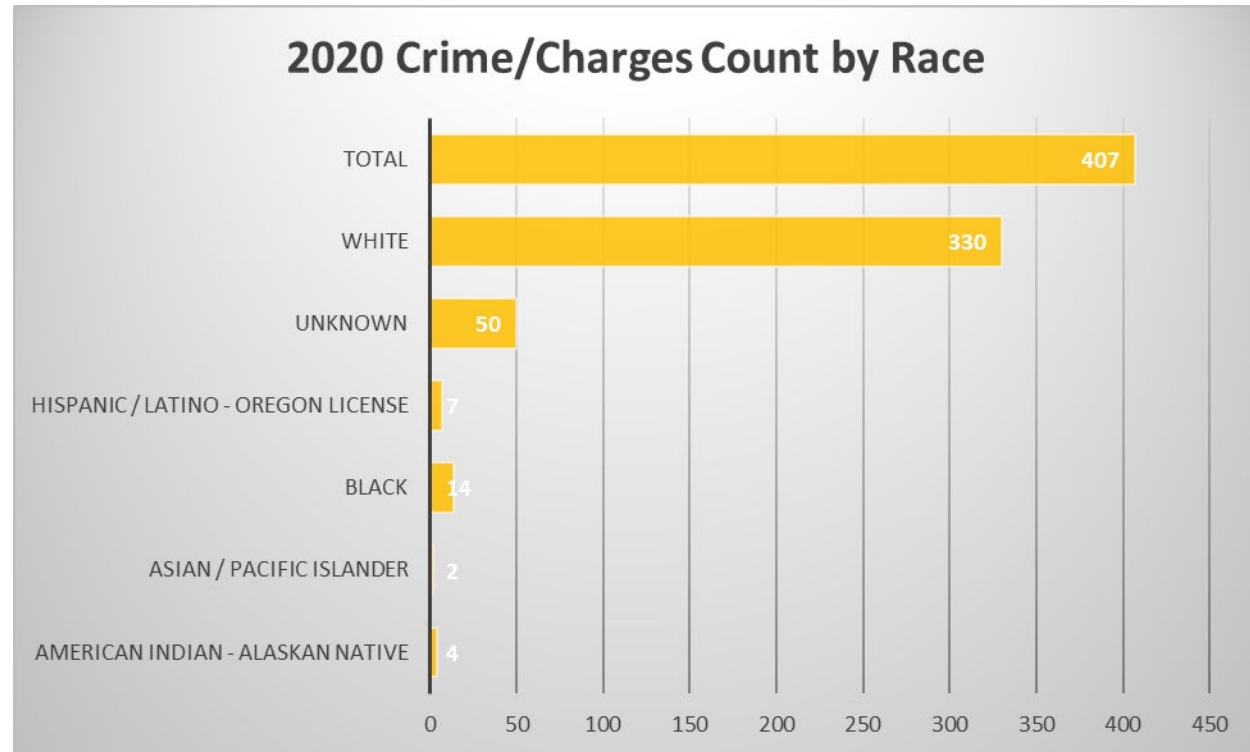

1. Wastewater: College Place Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade (State-mandated).
2. Water: Western College Place Water System Improvements.

4. Transportation: SE 12th Street Reconstruction (College Ave to Myra Rd)
5. Wastewater: Lift Station #5 Relocation/Reconstruction – SW 1st Street
6. Stormwater: SW 10th Street (College Ave to Dead End)
7. Water: Well #3 Addition of Generator & Chlorinator System
8. Wastewater: Wastewater Sewer Lining

Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade Project

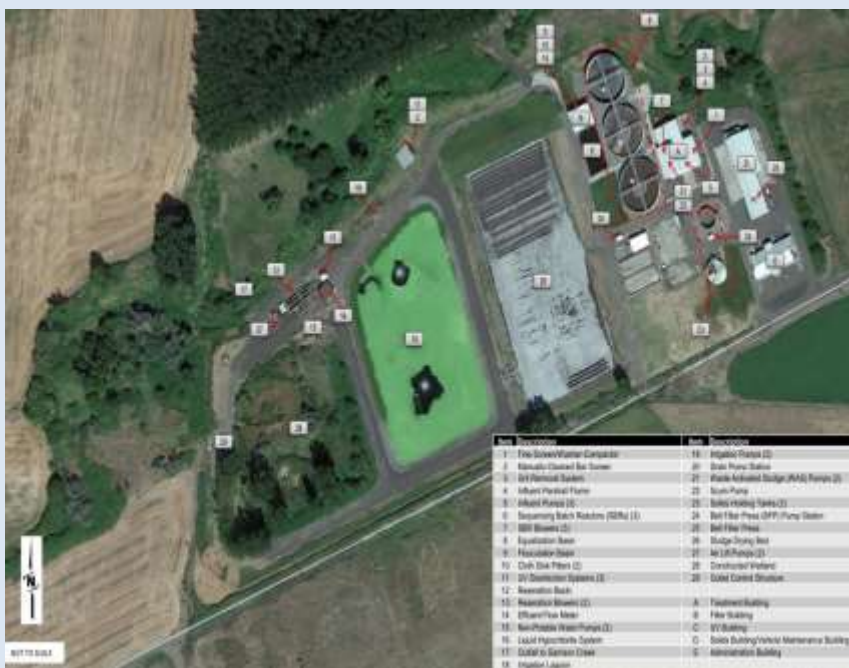
This project entails the renovation of the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). The WWTP is located at 430 Owens Rd just west of the City. It was constructed in 2000 and is a Sequence Batch Reactor facility which processes 1.6 Million Gallons of Sewage per Day for 5,095 connections. The renovation is required per the State Department of Ecology as part of the City's NPDES Permit. This renovation project must be constructed by 2023 to satisfy the State NPDES Permit. The project cost is estimated at around **\$25 million dollars**. The City is seeking State & Federal Funding partners as the cost is too big to burden utility ratepayers with.

- Increases storage capacity at the WWTP to prevent discharge to Garrison Creek during the critical period.
 - Required to be constructed by the end of 2023 per compliance schedule in NPDES Permit – which disallows discharge to Garrison Creek from May through October.
 - Improves water quality in Garrison Creek – tributary of the Walla Walla River which TMDL restrictions for bacteria, temperature, pH, toxics, and dissolved oxygen.
 - New storage lagoon will allow storage of effluent in slowly throughout the winter – which will eventually be irrigated onto crops; and will also store effluent in September and October – which will eventually be disinfected and discharged into Garrison Creek.
- Project includes
 - New 50 MG effluent storage lagoon.
 - Pump station to pump effluent up to new lagoon.
 - New irrigation pump station and distribution system to irrigate existing 110 acres of crops.
 - New system to disinfect lagoon effluent and allow discharge to Garrison Creek during non-critical period.
 - Improvements to existing influent screens.
- Financing
 - **Estimated construction cost of \$25 million.**
 - City self-funded a Facility Plan (\$235,000) in 2017 to 2018.
 - Submitted for State Ecology funding for design (\$2.5 million) in Fall 2018 – was ranked #4 and fully funded.
- Project Schedule
 - City has secured 80-acre parcel which will be site for new storage lagoon.
 - City has selected engineer and design is underway.
 - Design will be completed by end of 2021.
 - Anticipate application for Washington State Department of Ecology funding in Fall 2021 and construction during 2022 and 2023.

Western College Place Water System Improvements

The City of College Place population has grown from 8,765 to 9,780 or 11.5% between 2010 and 2020. The growth has primarily occurred in the western sections of the City. As such, the City's water system requires expansion to adequately serve current and future residents. None of the three (3) existing potable water wells or storage facilities exist in the western quadrant of the City. This project resolves this deficiency and improves operations and reliability by locating a 500,000-gallon water tank within the City's existing Wastewater Treatment Plant property. Additionally, a well would be drilled on city-owned property on SW Teal Rd.

Proposed Well #7

- Additional well needed to accommodate peak demands of existing and future customers.
- No system drinking water wells exist in western quadrant of the City.
- City acquired five acres of land for \$175,000 on SW Teal Rd to construct a wastewater lift station (in progress) and a drinking water well.
- Site is adjacent to future College Place Public Schools location.
- Well would supply peak demands for utility customers west of College Avenue including Bade Avenue, Stone Creek development, and Mojonner Rd corridor.
- **Estimated cost is \$3.5 million dollars for engineering, permitting, and construction.**

Proposed Elevated Water Storage Tank

- City system is deficient in water storage infrastructure to adequately serve the growing western section of the City.
- The proposed water tank would store 500,000 gallons of water.
- The proposed tank would be elevated and situated on top of the fifty-foot-tall bluff on the grounds of the Wastewater Treatment Plant to allow for appropriate water pressures consistent with the City's Zone 1 distribution system. Added benefit is another facility to allow telecommunication equipment.
- 10,000 feet of 16" water main is required between elevated reservoir and Zone 1 water system.
- Water storage facility would serve Stone Creek, Mojonner Rd, Homestead, Martin Airfield, and Whitman Drive areas.

REPLACEMENT WASTEWATER LIFT STATION #5

This project entails replacing wastewater lift station #5 which conveys wastewater sewage from 30% of the City. Unfortunately, the existing lift station which dates back to the 1970's is located in the middle of an existing sidewalk in front of 632 SW 1st Street. It is a visual nuisance and very difficult for city staff to access and maintain. The plan is to relocate the lift station to a vacant parcel of land between 529 and 609 SE 1st Street. This would provide appropriate room for city staff to maintain the facility. It also would not be a tripping hazard for pedestrians. **The estimated cost is \$1.2 Million dollars.**

We are providing the following exit recommendations for management's consideration. They are not referenced in the audit report. We may review the status of the following exit items in our next audit.

Accountability:

Cost Allocation -Payroll

The City did not implement our recommendation from the prior audit for the payroll cost allocation. We noted:

- The Council has not formally approved the written payroll cost allocation plan.
- While the cost allocation plan states what costs to allocate, it does not specify if costs are budgeted or actual amounts, and which period(s) the costs should be obtained from (e.g. prior year, next year's budget, etc.)
- The City did not update one of the basis for the Public Works Director Payroll allocation.
- City staff have indicated that the current cost allocation model and calculation is complex and can be hard to follow. Also, considering that the employee who created the written plan and allocation spreadsheet is no longer with the City, it creates a higher risk of undetected miscalculations and errors, especially if there is no individual at the City (other than the HR Director), who fully understands the cost allocation plan and performs a thorough review after the necessary updates are made to allocations.

We recommend the City:

- Formally approve its payroll cost allocation plan
- Update and review its written plan and calculations, to specify if costs used as the basis for allocations are budgeted or actual amounts, and which period(s) the costs should be obtained from (e.g. prior year, next year's budget, etc.). The documentation used to obtain the basis/factors should be documented and retained.
- Perform a thorough review of the cost allocation basis and calculations, to ensure the amounts are adequately and accurately supported by records.
- Perform a secondary review of data entered in the cost allocation calculation spreadsheet and payroll module to ensure they are entered accurately

- Consider reviewing its current payroll cost allocation plan, to determine if it is practical and reasonable, moving forward. The City can also reach out to the Center for Government Innovation if assistance is needed.

EFT Controls

The City updated their written procedures for EFT disbursements for vendors and payroll as well changes to banking and vendor information; however they did not implement an approved formal written policy.

We recommend the City formalize and approve a written policy for EFT payroll and vendor changes.

Cost Allocation - ER&R

The City did not implement our prior audit recommendations related to the Cost Allocation Plan. We noted the City:

- Council did not formally approve the written ER&R cost allocation plan.
- Uses the job cost rate for the fuel allocation and repairs & maintenance allocation, per fund. However, per the Cost Allocation Plan "Fuel is allocated solely according to the percentages of tracked fuel used by Fund/Department to total tracked fuel for the quarter."
 - Does not use any rate in the operating supplies allocation, per fund.
 - Uses the fuel cost rate for the small tools and equipment allocation, per fund.
 - Did not calculate a blended percentage per the plan. Per the cost allocation plan, a blended percentage of each fund's tracked fuel and Job costs to the total tracked fuel and Job costs for each quarter, should be applied to operating supplies, small tools and equipment, and repairs & maintenance expenditures.

We recommend the City:

- Formally approve its ER&R cost allocation plan.
- Review the quarterly cost allocations to ensure the allocations are properly calculated in accordance with the City's written ER&R cost allocation plan.

A&E Procurement

The City has a matrix for procurement procedures for different types of procurement on pages 13 and 14 in its policy. The policy also references RCW 39.80.030 and RCW 39.80.020 for procurement requirements which does not agree to the City's policy.

We recommend the City update its purchasing policy to ensure consistency between its policy and state law.

Financial Statements:

SEFA Preparation

We reviewed the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) and related Notes and noted:

- CFDA 66.468, Capitalization Grants for Drinking Water State Revolving Funds was overstated by \$397,132, due to the inclusion of the state-funded revolving loan expenditures. In addition the note disclosure for this grant was not included.
- The City included several notes that are not applicable.

We recommend the City review the SEFA and related notes to ensure that only federal grant expenditures are reported on the SEFA, and that only applicable and required notes disclosures are reported.

Financial Statement Presentation

We reviewed the financial statements, schedules, and note disclosures, and noted:
Note 1G Table:

- Fund 400 Storm Water Capital Reserve Account is mislabeled and should be reported as Fund 403.
- Fund 400 was understated by \$15 and Fund 401 was understated by \$8.

Note 2 Budget Table:

- Equipment Rental and Replacement is missing the account number of Fund 500 in the left column and the Flexible Benefits Plan Fund is missing account number of Fund 625 in left column.

Note 5 Debt Service Requirements:

- Total principal and total interest in Note 5 were overstated by \$1,696,403 and \$628,689 respectively.

Note 6 Other Post-employment benefits:

- Benefits paid are reported at \$14,039 which is prior year's number. It should be reported as \$28,694.
- The City was missing the total OPEB liability language "as calculated using alternative measurement method." The City also did not add the recommended paragraph for implementation "During the year ended (fiscal year end), the (city/county/district) adopted guidance for the presentation and disclosure of post-employment benefits other than pensions, as required by the BARS manual. This requirement resulted in the addition of a post-employment benefit liability reported on the Schedule of Liabilities." However this implementation paragraph is not required but recommended.

Note 7 Pension Plans

- The table in Note 7 for pension plans was not updated with this year's GASB numbers. PERS 1 was overstated by \$50,482, PERS 2/3 was overstated by \$81,783, LEOFF 1 was overstated by \$7,163, LEOFF 2 was overstated by \$160,968 and VFFRPF was overstated by \$30,566.

Note 9 (b) Subsequent Events:

- The City did not include the State of Emergency proclamation in its Note 9 (b) Subsequent Events.

Schedule 9

- City did not report its OPEB liability on Schedule 9 of \$546,405.

We recommend the City strengthen controls over its financial statements preparation and review process to ensure amounts and information reported are complete and accurate.

Providing direct flexible funding to cities across the country

President Joe Biden recently signed the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) into law. The sweeping **\$1.9 trillion** federal relief plan brings much needed financial assistance to individuals, businesses, and local governments across the nation.

Under the plan, U.S. cities and towns will receive **\$65.1 billion** in direct and flexible federal funds. The funding will begin to arrive in the next couple of months and will be distributed in two tranches: the first in 2021 and a second in 2022.



Washington cities are projected to receive more than **\$1.1 billion** in federal funding.

Cities can use ARP funds for:

- Responding to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Covering costs incurred from the public health emergency
- Replacing lost, delayed, or decreased revenues due to COVID-19
- Addressing the negative economic impacts on local businesses and nonprofits
- Making necessary investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure

A chart of projected allocations for cities is available on our website. **The estimates are not official values and are subject to change.**



Funds will be available to cities through December 31, 2024.

In addition to city funding, the ARP provides **\$1.4 billion** to Washington counties and critical funding to social programs, schools, small businesses, and individuals.

The bill includes funding for:

- Agriculture and nutrition programs, including extending SNAP and Pandemic EBT to keep families fed through the pandemic;
- Schools and institutions of higher education to safely reopen schools, address learning loss, and support students and staff, including broadband support for students;
- Childcare to help sustain providers and expand childcare assistance to 857,000 children;
- COVID-19 vaccinations, testing, treatment, and prevention, especially for hard-to-reach communities;
- Mental health and substance use disorder services;
- Emergency rental assistance, homeowner assistance, and other housing programs to help families pay rent, mortgages, and utilities;
- Transit agencies to prevent transit worker layoffs and prevent severe cuts to transit services that essential workers and the public rely on;
- Small business assistance, including specific programs for restaurants and live venues;
- Tribal government services;
- Extending enhanced unemployment benefits through September 2021, providing an additional \$300 per week, on top of all state unemployment benefits; and
- Expanding the Child Tax Credit and the Earned Income Tax Credit, two powerful and effective tools to end poverty.

Eating and Drinking Establishment COVID-19 Requirements

Summary of the March 17, 2021 changes:

1. Added Phase 3 requirements and modifications:
 - a. Indoor dining capacity allowed at 50%.
 - b. Table size increased to 10 with no household restrictions.
 - c. Alcohol service allowed until 12 a.m.
2. Other minor wording clarifications.

Summary of March 5, 2021 changes:

1. Renames this guidance document from Restaurant, Tavern, Brewery, Winery and Distillery to Eating and Drinking Establishment.
2. Includes night clubs in the list of business types included in this guidance.
3. Clarifies food is required to be offered at these businesses.
4. Clarifies while some live entertainment is permitted pursuant to the theater and performing arts guidance document, dancing is prohibited.

Eating and drinking establishments must adopt a written procedure that is at least as strict as the requirements in this document and that complies with the appropriate safety and health requirements and guidelines established by the Washington State Department of Labor & Industries and the Washington State Department of Health.

For purposes of this document an eating and drinking establishment includes, but is not limited to, restaurants, cafes, food courts, breweries, brewpubs, taverns, wine bars, wineries, distilleries, tasting rooms, private clubs and night clubs, or other establishments where food is offered/sold.

Prior to recommencing on-site services, all business owners are required to develop at each establishment, a comprehensive COVID-19 exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan which must be adhered to. A site-specific COVID-19 monitor shall be designated at each location to monitor the health of individuals and enforce the COVID-19 job site safety plan. A copy of the plan must be available at all locations and available for inspection by state and local authorities. Failure to meet this requirement may result in sanctions up to, and including, license suspension.

All eating and drinking establishments can refer to [Department of Health guidance](#) for additional recommendations.

Phase 1

1. Indoor seating is prohibited. Outdoor and open-air seating and to-go service are permitted, provided that all outdoor/open-air dining must comply with the requirements of the Outdoor and Open-air Seating Guidance [here](#).
2. For liquor licensees who want to add outdoor seating to their premises, please go to the Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board (WSLCB) website, [here](#), to access the Liquor Alterations Request Form. Please submit completed forms to liquoralterations@lcb.wa.gov.

Phase 2

1. Indoor seating is permitted at 25% capacity if physical distance between adjacent tables (as noted below) can be achieved. This includes food courts.
2. Table size is limited to a maximum of six (6) people and a maximum of two (2) households.
3. Alcohol service, delivery, and consumption, including beer, wine, and spirits, must end at 11:00 p.m. Food service may continue past 11 pm.

Phase 3

1. Indoor seating is permitted at 50% capacity if physical distance between adjacent tables (as noted below) can be achieved. This includes food courts.
2. Table size is limited to a maximum of ten (10) people with no household restriction.
3. Alcohol service, delivery, and consumption, including beer, wine, and spirits, must end at 12:00 a.m. Food service may continue past 12 a.m.

All Phases

1. Liquor licensees must offer food service. Food may be sold or provided free-of-charge in at least one of the following ways:
 - a. Onsite food: At a minimum, food service should include a combination of small serving food items such as a mix of hors d'oeuvre type foods, cheeses, fruits, vegetables, deli-style meats, chips, pretzels, nuts, popcorn, crackers, or similar items. Food may be prepackaged for individual sale and consumption or prepared off-site for plating for the customer.
 - b. Offsite food: Customers may bring food from an outside business. The liquor licensee must post in a visible place, a list of multiple local restaurants or food trucks where customers can purchase food during hours of operation. The list shall include names, addresses, contact information, and hours of operation for each restaurant or food truck named.
2. Tables must be placed so that adjacent tables are a minimum of 6 feet away from each other, or there must be a physical barrier or wall at least standing height tall separating booths or tables.
3. If the establishment does not offer table service (i.e. wait staff), they must have protocols in place to ensure adequate social distancing at food and/or drink pick-up stations, and within their seating area.
4. No bar area seating is permitted. This is the area with a bar table/counter where patrons sit or stand side-by-side. If an establishment has bar area seating it must be closed off to prohibit use. Counter-style seating is permitted in other areas of the establishment (indoors or outdoors). Six feet of distance is required between other tables.
5. Customers must wear a face covering anytime they are not actively eating or drinking. This includes when arriving or leaving, while going to the restroom, and while they are seated at tables and talking.
6. Single use menus or reusable menus that are sanitized after each use are required.
7. Minimize the number of staff serving any given table. It is strongly recommended that one staff person take a table's order, bring all of their beverages/food/utensils, take their payment, etc.
8. Hand sanitizer should be available at entry for all staff and patrons (assuming supply availability).
9. Any condiments typically left on the table (ketchup, soy sauce, etc.) must be single-use or sanitized after each use.

10. Buffets and salad bars are permitted and must follow [Department of Health guidance](#).
11. All establishments must have implemented a plan to ensure proper physical distancing in lobby/waiting areas/payment counters.
12. Standing is prohibited in any area of the establishment, except when engaging in allowable entertainment activities or while in the lobby/waiting area. In these instances, 6 feet of distance between patrons must be maintained.
13. Please see [Indoor Entertainment Guidance](#) for allowable activities such as darts, billiards, and arcade games, etc.
14. Please see [Theater and Performing Arts Guidance](#) for allowable live entertainment. Dancing is prohibited.

Safety and Health Requirements

All eating and drinking establishment owners have a general obligation to maintain a safe and healthy workplace in accordance with state and federal law and safety and health rules for a variety of workplace hazards. Employers must specifically ensure operations follow the main Labor & Industries COVID-19 requirements to protect workers. COVID-19 workplace and safety requirements can be found [here](#). Real Estate COVID-19 Requirements

Summary of March 17, 2021 changes:

- Adding Phase 3 requirements and changes including:
 - Increase office capacity to 50%.
 - Remove the requirement that clients must make an appointment to go to an office.
 - Increase number of allowed individuals to “show” properties at one time to 10.

In Phase 1

- Open houses are prohibited state-wide.

In Phase 2:

- Office capacity limited to 25%.
- Open houses are permitted. No more than ten people onsite at a time. Physically distancing to ensure 6 feet between participants should be maintained where possible.
- Property viewings, inspections, appraisals, and final walk-throughs shall be arranged by appointment and are limited to five people on site (this does not include the real estate agent/realtor), exercising social distancing at all times.

In Phase 3:

- Office capacity limited to 50%.
- Property viewings, inspections, appraisals, and final walk-throughs shall be arranged by appointment and are limited to ten people on site (this does not include the real estate agent/realtor), exercising social distancing at all times.

In all phases

Safety and Health Requirements

All real estate brokers must post signage at the entrance to their business requiring their customers to use cloth face coverings when inside the business.

Real Estate industry specific requirements

Below is a list of additional requirements that must be met before resuming operations for Real Estate activity.

Out of office activities:

In-person residential and commercial real estate activities under RCW 18.85.011(17) and related activities performed by real estate brokers and industry partners for both improved and unimproved real property shall only be permitted with the following limitations:

- a) Remote meetings with customers are encouraged where possible; and
- b) In-person activities including property viewings, inspections, appraisals, and final walk-throughs are limited to the maximum number of people on site for the counties phase, exercising social distancing at all times.

It is permissible to engage in real estate sales, leasing, and property management as real estate brokers, appraisers, settlement agents and escrow officers, property inspectors (including consultants such as

engineers, architects, and others routinely engaged in such transactions), property stagers, movers, photographers, sign installers, mortgage loan originators, processors, and underwriters, and other necessary office personnel including IT professionals, and back office staff necessary to maintain office operations, along with those government workers necessary to review real estate excise tax and record documents.

All real estate and mortgage activities must meet social distancing and appropriate health and worker protection measures before proceeding. For in-person activities, real estate brokers and industry partners must wear cloth face coverings and should require clients and customers to do the same.

Office activities for residential and commercial real estate firms:

Social Distancing:

Gatherings of any size must be prevented by taking breaks and performing any activities in shifts, including lunch. Any time two or more persons must meet, ensure a minimum of 6-feet of separation.

1. Identify and control “choke points” and “high-risk areas” at locations where workers and members of the public typically congregate so that social distancing is always maintained. Consider relocating from small areas into larger rooms to accommodate more area for social distancing.
2. Minimize interactions during activities; ensure a minimum of 6-foot separation by physical barriers, and/or marking floors with tape. Limit the number of participants based on facility size and activities to allow for a 6-foot separation.
3. Arrange furniture to encourage social distancing.
4. Limit guest occupancy to the appropriate percentage maximum building occupancy or lower for the phase of the county.

Sick Employee and Independent Contractor Plan:

1. Screen all workers at the beginning of their day by asking them if they have a fever, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, muscle aches, or new loss of taste or smell.
2. Ask the employee and independent contractor to take their temperature at home prior to arriving at work or take their temperature when they arrive. Thermometers used shall be ‘no touch’ or ‘no contact’ to the greatest extent possible. If a ‘no touch’ or ‘no contact’ thermometer is not available, the thermometer must be properly sanitized between each use. Any worker with a temperature of 100.4°F or higher is considered to have a fever and must be sent home.
3. Create policies which encourage workers to stay home or leave the location when feeling sick or when they have been in close contact with a confirmed positive case. If they develop symptoms of acute respiratory illness, they must seek medical attention and inform their employer.
4. Have employees and independent contractors inform their supervisors if they have a sick family member at home with COVID-19. If an employee or independent contractor has a family member sick with COVID-19, that employee or independent contractor must follow the isolation/quarantine requirements as established by the State Department of Health.
5. Instruct workers to report to their supervisor if they develop symptoms of COVID-19 (e.g., fever, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, muscle aches, or new loss of taste or smell). If symptoms develop during a shift, the worker should be immediately sent home. If symptoms develop while the worker is not working, the worker should not return to work until they have been evaluated by a healthcare provider.

6. If an employee or independent contractor is confirmed to have a COVID-19 infection, employers should inform fellow employees and independent contractors of their possible exposure to COVID-19 in the workplace but maintain confidentiality as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The employer should instruct fellow employees and independent contractors on how to proceed based on the CDC Public Health Recommendations for Community-Related Exposure.

Training:

1. All employees and independent contractors must be trained on the worksite's policies, these requirements and all relevant sanitization and social distancing protocols. They must also be trained about COVID-19 and how to prevent its transmission. This can be accomplished through weekly safety meetings, where attendance is logged by the system, supervisor, or COVID site supervisor.

Facilities:

1. Restrict access where unauthorized visitors may enter, most specifically "back of the house" doors and entry points.
2. Real estate businesses that operate an office facility must also follow safety requirements outlined in the professional services guidance for reopening office space working environments.

All real estate brokers, firms, independent contractors and industry partners operating have a general obligation to keep a safe and healthy facility in accordance with state and federal law, and comply with the following COVID-19 worksite-specific safety practices, as outlined in Governor Jay Inslee's Healthy Washington plan, and in accordance with the Washington State Department of Labor & Industries [General Requirements and Prevention Ideas for Workplaces](#) and the Washington State Department of Health Workplace and Employer Resources & Recommendations at <https://www.doh.wa.gov/Coronavirus/workplace>.

SPECTATOR EVENTS

COVID-19 Requirements

Included here: stadiums—professional—higher education—and K-12 schools, ballparks, motorsports racetracks, rodeos and similar venues.

Not included here: indoor arenas, indoor sports facilities, street fairs, park venues or other outdoor venues without permanent seating and similar venues.

Phase 3:

Outdoor venues with seating that meet the following requirements may exceed 200 people maximum attendance:

- A facility must have individual designated seating capability. Open, unreserved seating not allowed.
- A facility must have controlled entrances and exits and the ability to monitor exact attendance.

An outdoor venue that meets those requirements may:

- Open to a capacity of 25% per section or 9,000 spectators maximum, whichever is lower.
- For smaller facilities up to 400 spectators maximum allowed at 50% capacity. In order to exceed 400 spectators a facility must be able to accommodate over 400 spectators at 25% capacity and capacity must not exceed 9,000 spectators total.
- On April 15, 2021, conditions will be re-evaluated to assess whether a further increase in percentage seating capacity can be allowed.

Additional venue requirements:

- Each facility must have a plan for handling congestion and reducing crowding, including entrance and exits, parking facilities, stairs and elevators, and any areas where lines form. Facility staff will monitor the execution of the plan.
- Tickets must be sold in groups of 1-8. Each group of 1-8 spectators must be 6 feet away (side-to-side and front-to-back) from other groups of 1-8. Groups of 1-8 spectators should come from no more than two different households. Facilities with benches, bleachers or non-numbered seating must block off a portion of seating to ensure groups are distanced.
- Suites or other indoor viewing areas, including dine-in food service areas, limited to 25% capacity and windows are required to be open at all times.
- Outdoor viewing areas without permanent seating (decks, grass berms, eating areas etc.) are limited to one seated group (1-6 people) per 100 square ft. Each group will be in a reserved space, only available to the group or pod who purchased a specific location. Groups of 1-6 should come from no more than two different households. Facility staff must monitor and restrict interactions between groups. Each outdoor viewing area limited to a maximum of 100 spectators. Outdoor viewing areas without reserved seating only allowed if they are a part of a facility that has individual designated seating capability and controlled entrances and exits. Spectators in these areas count towards the total allowed maximum of 9,000 spectators. Bleachers are not considered “outdoor viewing areas” and must be limited to 25% capacity.

- Retail shops subject to current guidelines for in-store retail.
- Removal of masks and facial coverings only allowed while actively eating or drinking in assigned seating.
- Lines for food and beverages must be marked to ensure 6 feet a distance between each person waiting in line.
- Lines for restrooms must be marked to ensure 6 feet a distance between each person waiting in line. All restrooms should be open to increase dispersion of users among restrooms facilities.
- Lines may not extend out into designated walkways in a way that impedes the flow and/or compromises the ability to appropriately physically distance in those designated walkways

Safety and Health Requirements

All facility owners have a general obligation to maintain a safe and healthy workplace in accordance with state and federal law and safety and health rules for a variety of workplace hazards. Emerging Variant Cases in the United States†



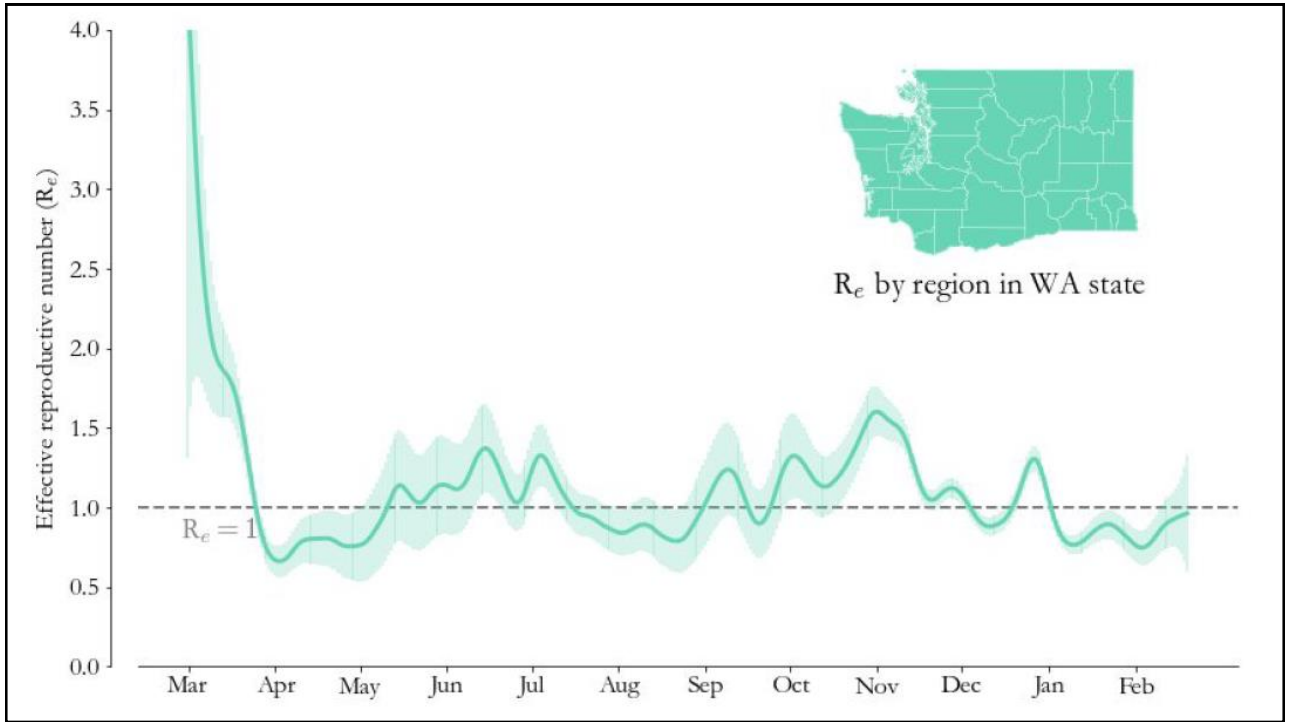

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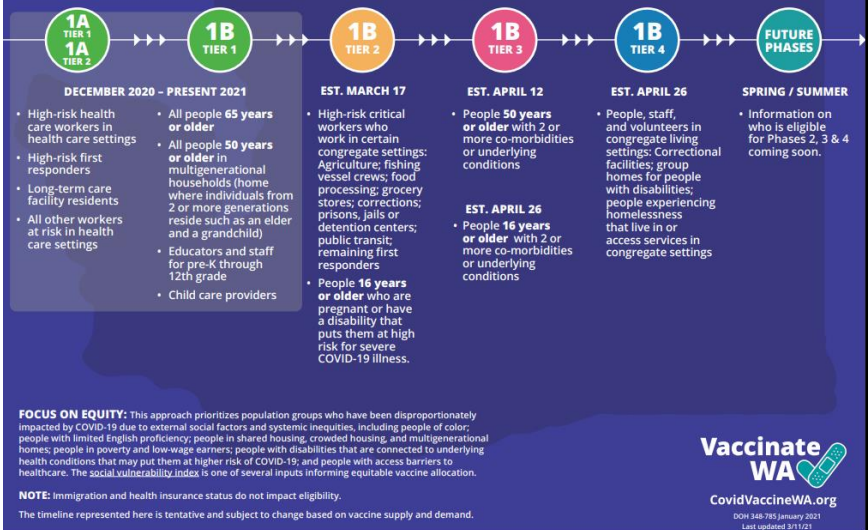

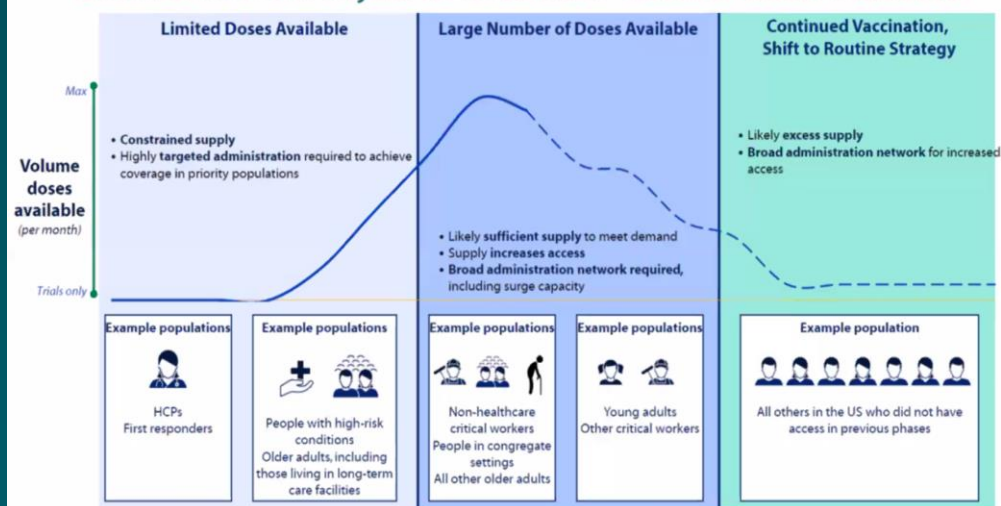

- **Traditional** Delivery Systems
 - Healthcare system (hospitals and clinics)
 - Pharmacies

- **Enhanced** Delivery Systems:
 - Local jurisdiction operation high volume community vaccination sites
 - Mobile vaccination teams
 - Community-based pop-up clinics
- **Mass Vaccination** Delivery Systems (state-supported):
 - High through-put mass vaccination sites
 - Mobile vaccination teams

Note: Vaccine Supply Constraints Remain

Estimated total capacity with adequate supply ~150,000 doses/day

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Vaccine Allocation Decisions

- **Overview:**
- ~1400 provider facilities enrolled
- 100,000-150,000 more doses requested than allocated each week
- 5 weeks of prioritizing second doses due to excessive requests – FINALLY OVER!
- **Weekly process:** multi-step process that starts each Saturday and finishes Thursday night
- Fully enrolled vaccine providers place their requested orders through the state's Immunization Information System (WALLS).
- Local Health Jurisdictions give input on which provider sites are priorities in their communities the following week.
- **Allocation is then decided based on balancing several factors:**
 - Pro-rata population of the eligible groups by county (based on the current phase).
 - Data from each provider about the amount of vaccine they are requesting, the populations they serve, the type of storage, and their capacity.
 - Information on provider inventory on hand, documented throughput, and whether providers are using 95 percent of their allocated vaccine within 7 days.
 - Equity factors: Ensuring vaccine is in all counties; ensuring providers serving the highest risk populations get vaccine.
 - Getting a proportion of available vaccine to all provider types (hospitals, pharmacies, mass vaccination sites, and clinics/federal qualified health centers/local health clinic).

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Recommendation: Equity as a cross-cutting factor

People with access barriers to health care: People with limited transportation, people with limited English proficiency, individuals with disabilities, people without health insurance, undocumented people

People at higher risk for exposure: Farm and factory workers, essential workers, people who live in congregate housing, people experiencing homelessness, people who are incarcerated or detained, people in workplaces with outbreaks

People essential to health and wellbeing of populations at higher risk: Doulas, caregivers (both formal and informal), home care aides, health care interpreters, community and mutual aid volunteers, community health workers

People who live in areas with greater spread: Geographic hotspots and outbreaks, congregate housing with outbreaks

People who have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 because of systemic inequities: Communities of color, people with limited English proficiency, individuals with disabilities, low-income people

People at risk for severe illness: Older adults and elders, pregnant people, people with underlying medical conditions that put them at a higher risk for severe morbidity or mortality if infected with COVID-19

People who are at higher risk for spreading COVID-19 to high risk populations: Caregivers, people living in multi-generational households, children and youth, essential workers, people who must travel for work

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Strategies to Ensure Equitable Access

1. **Prioritize communities with higher social vulnerability** to COVID-19 by using [Washington Tracking Network, Information by Location Mapping Tool: COVID-19 Social Vulnerability Index](#).
2. **Address work schedule barriers through:**
 1. Evening & weekend appointments
 2. Onsite, employment based vaccine clinics
 3. Encouraging employers to provide paid time for getting a vaccine
3. **Address language barriers through:**
 1. Translation of materials
 2. Culturally & linguistically appropriate outreach
 3. Interpretation services
4. **Promote vaccine trust and confidence** by partnering with trusted community leaders and members.
5. **Focus on the hard to reach groups** – put more effort into reaching the people who will be missed by traditional channels.

Brief Summary of Engrossed Second Substitute Bill

- Authorizes a 12-year extension of existing eight-year and 12-year Multi-Family Property Tax Exemptions (MFTEs) that are set to expire if they meet certain affordability requirements.
- Establishes a new 20-year property tax exemption for the creation of permanently affordable homes.
- Temporarily expands the definition of a city not otherwise eligible for the 12-year MFTE and the 20-year exemption for permanently affordable homes to include all cities until December 31, 2031 and authorizes those cities to offer the 12-year MFTE and the 20-year exemption for permanently affordable homes until December 31, 2024.

Background:

Property Tax.

All property is subject to a tax each year based on the highest and best use, unless a specific exemption is provided by law. The county assessor determines assessed value for each property and calculates property taxes. The property tax bill for an individual property is determined by

multiplying the assessed value of the property by the tax rate for each taxing district in which the property is located. The aggregate of all regular tax levies upon real and personal property by the state and all taxing districts may not exceed 1 percent of the true and fair value of the property. In addition, the aggregate regular levies of junior taxing districts and senior taxing districts, other than the state, may not exceed \$5.90 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Multifamily Property Tax Exemption.

The Multifamily Property Tax Exemption (MFTE) (also referred to as the multi-unit urban housing property tax exemption) exempts real property associated with the construction, conversion, or rehabilitation of qualified, multi-unit residential structures located in residential targeted areas (RTAs) contained within an urban center. The tax exemption applies only to the value of the construction, conversion, or rehabilitation projects and does not exempt the value of the underlying property or other improvements on the property.

The tax exemption on qualifying property lasts for eight consecutive years. However, the exemption is extended to a 12-year period if the owner commits to renting or selling at least 20 percent of multi-family housing units as affordable housing to low- and moderate-income (LMI) households.

To qualify for an exemption, the housing project must be located within RTA designated by a qualifying county or city. The RTA must be in an urban center that lacks sufficient residential housing, including affordable housing, to meet the needs of the public who would likely live in the urban center if housing were available.

Cities with a population of 15,000 or more may designate an RTA. Certain smaller cities are also eligible. Counties with an unincorporated population over 350,000 are eligible to designate an RTA. The county-designated RTA must be in an unincorporated area of the county that is within an urban growth area under the Growth Management Act.

Property owners within a designated RTA must submit an application for the tax exemption to the designating city or county. The city or county may include additional eligibility requirements for the tax exemption, including a higher percentage of units used for affordable housing to qualify for the 12-year exemption. Counties eligible to apply the tax exemption must require owners to commit to selling or renting at least 20 percent of the multi-family housing units for affordable housing in order to qualify for either the eight or 12-year exemption.

For properties receiving a 12-year exemption where that exemption is set to expire after June 11, 2020, but prior to December 31, 2021, the exemption is extended until December 31, 2021. Any eligibility criteria or limitations that apply to the underlying exemption also apply to the extension.

For the purpose of the MFTE, affordable housing is housing for LMI households that does not exceed one third of the household's monthly income. Low-income households must have an income that is no more than 80 percent of the median income of their county. Moderate-income

households must have an income between 80 and 115 percent of the median income of their county. A county where the median house price is 130 percent of the statewide median house price is considered to be a high-cost area. For high cost areas, low-income households must have an income that is no more than 100 percent of the median income of their county and moderate-income households must have an income between 100 and 150 percent of the median income of their county.

Tax Preferences.

State law provides for a range of tax preferences that confer reduced tax liability upon a designated class of taxpayer. Tax preferences include tax exclusions, deductions, exemptions, preferential tax rates, deferrals, and credits. Currently, Washington has over 650 tax preferences, including a variety of sales and use tax exemptions. Legislation that establishes or expands a tax preference must include a Tax Preference Performance Statement that identifies the public policy objective of the preference, as well as specific metrics that the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee (JLARC) can use to evaluate the effectiveness of the preference. All new tax preferences automatically expire after 10 years unless an alternative expiration date is provided.

Summary of Engrossed Second Substitute Bill:

Until December 31, 2031, the definition of "city" is modified to include any city. Until December 31, 2024, a city not otherwise eligible to offer the MFTE program may offer the 12-year MFTE to qualifying properties in areas zoned for average density of 15 dwelling units per acre, or for cities with a population over 20,000, a minimum density equivalent of 25 dwelling units or more per acre. In addition, counties with an unincorporated population over 170,000 are eligible to designate an RTA for purposes of the MFTE program.

The definition of multiple-unit housing is modified to include a group of buildings with four or more dwelling units. For purposes of calculating median family income, city and metropolitan statistical area family median income may be used in addition to county family median income.

High-cost areas and the associated low-income household and median-income household median family income thresholds for high cost areas are removed from the MFTE program.

A property that qualified for and used an eight-year or 12-year exemption and is within 18 months of expiration may apply to extend the exemption for an additional 12 years if they meet minimum locally adopted requirements for affordability. To qualify, an applicant must be approved by the city or county and commit to rent or sell at least 20 percent of the housing units to low-income households.

An MFTE applicant must provide notice to tenants of rent restricted units at the end of both the tenth and eleventh years of the exemption period. An MFTE applicant must provide tenant relocation assistance to a qualified tenant in an amount equal to one month's rent at the time the exemption expires. To be eligible for tenant relocation assistance, the tenant must occupy an income-restricted unit and qualify as a low-income household.

A governing authority may adopt requirements that applicants pay prevailing wages, follow certain payroll requirements, use apprenticeship requirements, or include a contracting inclusion plan developed in consultation with the Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises.

An owner of rehabilitated or newly constructed property must file additional information with the city or county including unit size, annual income, and household size. All cities and counties that issue certificates of tax exemption must report annually by April 1 of each year. A city or county must be in compliance with reporting requirements to offer certificates of tax exemption under the MFTE program.

At the conclusion of the exemption period, the value of the new housing, construction, conversion or rehabilitation improvements must be considered as new construction for property tax purposes as though the property was not exempt under the MFTE program. No new MFTE applications may be approved on or after January 1, 2032, or any extensions of existing tax exemptions on or after January 1, 2046.

A new 20-year tax exemption is created for properties that sell or rent 25 percent of the units to non-profit organizations or local government partners that assure permanently affordable homeownership. Permanently affordable homeownership units must be sold to households earning no more than 80 percent of the average median income for the city or local jurisdiction in which the unit is located. A local jurisdiction may assign and collect an administration fee at each point of sale to cover the administrative costs for oversight of the permanently affordable homeownership program. Permanently affordable homeownership is housing sponsored by a nonprofit organization or local government that restricts resale to low and moderate income buyers and executes at least a 99-year ground lease or deed restriction with each sale. Commerce must develop a template for deed restrictions that can be used by local governments.

Until December 31, 2024, a city not otherwise qualified to offer the 20-year permanently affordable homeownership exemption may offer the 20-year MFTE to qualifying properties in areas zoned for average density of 15 dwelling units per acre, or for cities with a population over 20,000, a minimum density equivalent of 25 dwelling units or more per acre.

Commerce must provide an annual report to the appropriate committees of the Legislature and JLARC on city and county compliance with MFTE reporting requirements.

For preliminary or final applications submitted on or before February 15, 2020, with any outstanding application requirements, such as obtaining a temporary certificate of occupancy, the city or county may choose to extend the deadline for completion for an additional five years. The five-year extension begins immediately following the completion of any outstanding applications or previously authorized extensions, whichever is later

Brief Description: Improving the state's climate response through updates to the state's comprehensive planning framework.

Committee Activity: Housing & Local Government: 3/16/21.

Brief Summary of Bill

- Adds a goal of climate change mitigation to the listed goals of the Growth Management Act (GMA).
- Adds a climate change and resiliency element to the list of elements that must be included within the comprehensive plans certain counties and cities must adopt under the GMA.
- Requires the Department of Commerce (Commerce), in consultation with other state agencies, to publish guidelines that specify a set of actions counties and cities have available to take related to greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions reductions and vehicle miles traveled (VMT) reductions.
- Requires the climate change and resiliency element of the comprehensive plan of certain counties and cities to identify actions the jurisdiction will take, consistent with guidelines adopted by Commerce, to reduce GHG emissions and VMT.
- Requires the climate change and resiliency element of the

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comprehensive plan of certain counties and cities to address the adverse impacts of climate change on people, property, and ecological systems.

- Specifies the process by which the GHG emissions reduction sub-element of the climate change and resiliency element takes effect.
- Requires Commerce to adopt guidance that creates a model climate change and resiliency element.
- Requires the Department of Ecology to update its Shoreline Master Program guidelines to require Shoreline Master Programs to address the impact of sea level rise and increased storm severity.
- Adds consideration of climate change impacts to the list of elements that must be contained in optional comprehensive flood control management plans.

SENATE COMMITTEE ON HOUSING & LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Background: Growth Management Act. The Growth Management Act (GMA) is the comprehensive land use planning framework for counties and cities in Washington. Enacted in 1990 and 1991, the GMA establishes land use designation and environmental protection requirements for all Washington counties and cities. The GMA also establishes a significantly wider array of planning duties for 28 counties, and the cities within those counties, which are obligated to satisfy all planning requirements of the GMA. These jurisdictions are sometimes referred to as fully planning under the GMA.

The GMA directs fully planning jurisdictions to adopt internally consistent comprehensive land use plans. Comprehensive plans are implemented through locally adopted development regulations, and both the plans and the local regulations are subject to review and revision requirements prescribed in the GMA. Comprehensive plans must contain certain required elements, including a transportation element, a land use element, and a capital facilities plan element, among others. In developing their comprehensive plans, counties and cities must consider various goals set forth in statute, including, for example, urban growth, housing, and economic development.

Growth Management Act—Comprehensive Plan Updates. Counties and cities are required to review and, if needed, revise their comprehensive plans and development regulations every eight years. Counties, and the cities within them, are grouped into four year classes for when the obligation to review and revise their comprehensive plans commence. The next round of required comprehensive plan updates begins with King, Kitsap, Snohomish,

and Pierce counties, and the cities within those counties, in 2024.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reductions. Washington enacted legislation in 2008 that set a series of limits on the emission of greenhouse gases (GHGs) within the state. Those limits were modified by legislation enacted in 2020, such that Washington must limit anthropogenic emissions of GHGs to achieve the following reductions for the state:

- by 2020, reduce overall emissions of GHGs to 1990 levels, or 90.5 million metric tons;
- by 2030, reduce overall emissions of GHGs to 45 percent below 1990 levels, or 50 million metric tons;
- by 2040, reduce overall emissions of GHGs to 70 percent below 1990 levels, or 27 million metric tons; and
- by 2050, reduce overall emissions of GHGs to 95 percent below 1990 levels, or 5 million metric tons, and achieve net-zero GHG emissions.

State Environmental Policy Act. The State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) establishes a review process for state and local governments to identify environmental impacts that may result from governmental decisions, such as the issuance of permits or adoption of land-use plans. The SEPA environmental review process involves a project proponent or the lead agency completing an environmental checklist to identify and evaluate probable environmental impacts. Government decisions that the SEPA checklist process identifies as having significant adverse environmental impacts must then undergo a more comprehensive environmental analysis in the form of an environmental impact statement.

Regional Transportation Planning Organizations. A regional transportation planning organization is a voluntary association of local governments within a county, or within geographically contiguous counties, created primarily to prepare regional transportation plans, to ensure local and regional coordination of transportation planning, and to maintain a six-year regional transportation improvement program.

Comprehensive Flood Control Management Plans. Counties may adopt comprehensive flood control management plans for any drainage basin located wholly or partially within the county. Whenever any river flows through two counties, the counties may contract with each other for flood control and settling disputes regarding flood control.

Shoreline Master Programs. The Shoreline Management Act (SMA) involves a cooperative regulatory approach between local governments and the state. The Department of Ecology and local governments are authorized to adopt necessary and appropriate rules for implementing the provisions of the SMA. At the local level, SMA regulations are developed in local shoreline master programs. All counties and cities with shorelines of the state are required to adopt shoreline master programs that regulate land-use activities in shoreline areas of the state.

Summary of Bill: Goals of the Growth Management Act—Climate Change. The issue of

climate change is added as a goal of the GMA. Under the climate change goal, comprehensive plans, development regulations, and regional plans must support state GHG emissions reduction goals and foster resiliency to climate impacts and natural hazards, among other requirements.

Applicability of Provisions of the Bill. The requirements of the GHG emissions reduction sub-element of the climate change and resiliency element apply only to those counties required or that choose to plan fully under the GMA, and the cities within them with a population greater than 6000, that meet either of the following criteria as of January 1, 2021:

- a county with a population density of at least 100 people per square mile and a population of at least 200,000; or
- a county with a population density of at least 75 people per square mile and an annual growth rate of at least 1.75 percent as determined by the Office of Financial Management.

Once a county meets either of the sets of criteria described above, the requirement to conform with the GHG emissions reduction subelement of the climate change and resiliency element remains in effect, even if the county no longer meets one of these sets of criteria.

If the population of a county that previously had not been required to conform with the GHG emissions reduction subelement of the climate change and resiliency element changes such that the county meets either of the sets of criteria described above, the county, and the cities within that county, must adopt a GHG emissions reduction sub-element at the next scheduled update of the comprehensive plan.

The requirements of the amendments to the transportation element of comprehensive plans apply to the counties and cities required to comply with the GHG emissions reduction sub-element, as well as all cities planning fully under the GMA that have a population greater than 6000.

The requirements of the amendments to the land use element of comprehensive plans apply to all counties and cities required to comply with the amendments to the transportation element, as well as all counties planning fully under the GMA that have a population greater than 20,000.

The requirements of the amendments to the rural element of comprehensive plans apply to all counties planning fully under the GMA that have a population greater than 20,000.

Growth Management Act—Elements of Comprehensive Plans. The land use element of comprehensive plans should give special consideration to achieving environmental justice in its goals and policies, and must avoid creating or worsening environmental health disparities. The land use element must also reduce and mitigate the risk to lives and property posed by wildfires by using land use planning tools, which may include reducing

residential development pressure in the wildland urban interface area.

The forecasts of traffic demand contained within the transportation element of comprehensive plans must address forecasts of multimodal transportation demands and needs within cities and urban growth areas, and forecasts of traffic demands and needs outside of cities and urban growth areas, to inform the development of a transportation element that balances transportation system safety and convenience to accommodate all users of the transportation system to safely, reliably, and efficiently provide access and mobility to people and goods.

A development approval may not be denied because it fails to meet traffic level of service standards if it is possible to provide for the transportation needs of a development through pedestrian and bicycle facility improvements, increased or enhanced public transportation service, ride-sharing programs, demand management, or other transportation systems management strategies funded by the development.

The park and recreation element of comprehensive plans must include a consideration of the health disparities map, published by the Department of Health (DOH), to increase greenspace in the most pollution-burdened locations.

Growth Management Act—Climate Change and Resiliency Element. Comprehensive plans must include a climate change and resiliency element. The element must be designed to reduce overall GHG emissions and must enhance resiliency to and avoid the adverse impacts of climate change. The climate change and resiliency element is divided into two subelements—a GHG emissions reduction subelement and a resiliency subelement. The GHG emissions reduction subelement is mandatory for the counties and cities described below and encouraged for all other jurisdictions. The resiliency subelement is mandatory for all counties and cities fully planning under the GMA and is encouraged for all other jurisdictions.

The GHG emissions reduction subelement of the comprehensive plan, and its related development regulations, must identify the actions the jurisdiction will take during the planning cycle consistent with the guidelines published by the Department of Commerce (Commerce) that will:

- result in reductions in overall GHG emissions generated by the transportation and land use systems within the jurisdiction, but without increasing emissions elsewhere in the state;
- result in reductions in vehicle miles traveled (VMT) within the jurisdiction, but without increasing emissions elsewhere in the state; and
- prioritize reductions in communities that experience disproportionate impacts and harm due to air pollution in order to maximize the cobenefits of reduced air pollution.

Actions not specifically identified in the guidelines published by Commerce may be considered to be consistent with those guidelines only if they are projected to achieve GHG

emissions reductions or VMT reductions equivalent to what would be required of the jurisdiction under Commerce's guidelines and they are supported by scientifically credible projections.

Until December 31, 2034, actions not specifically identified in the guidelines developed by Commerce, or considered to be consistent with those guidelines according to the process described above, must still be considered to be sufficient to meet the requirements of the GHG emissions reduction subelement, and must be approved by Commerce if the actions provide for the authorization of the development of middle housing types. Certain actions must be considered to satisfy the GHGs reduction subelement of the act if the actions provide authorization for middle housing in certain areas. "Middle housing" means accessory dwelling units and at least one of the following housing types: duplexes; triplexes; or quadplexes, in all zoning districts within an urban growth area that permit detached single-family residences.

The resiliency subelement must, among other things, equitably enhance resiliency to, and avoid or substantially reduce the adverse impacts of, climate change on people, property, and ecological systems through goals, policies, and programs consistent with the best available science and scientifically credible climate projections and impact scenarios. A natural hazard mitigation plan or similar plan that complies with the applicable requirements of the GMA may be adopted by reference to satisfy those requirements.

If a county or city intends to incorporate by reference a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) natural hazard mitigation plan in order to meet the requirement of the resiliency subelement, and the natural hazard mitigation plan is not adopted within three years prior to the required update set forth in the GMA but is intended to be adopted no later than two years after the required update set forth in the GMA, the county or city may be granted an extension to meeting the requirements of the resiliency subelement by providing notice to Commerce. If a county or city incorporates by reference a FEMA natural hazard mitigation plan in order to meet the requirement of the resiliency subelement, the plan must be guided by the climate change goal of the GMA and must comply with the requirements set forth in the resiliency subelement.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction and Vehicle Miles Traveled Reduction Guidelines. Commerce, in consultation with the Department of Ecology (Ecology), DOH, and the Department of Transportation (WSDOT), must publish guidelines that specify a set of measures, counties and cities have available to them to take through updates to their comprehensive plans and development regulations that have a demonstrated ability to reduce GHG emissions in order to achieve statewide GHG emissions reductions required by the state Clean Air Act, allowing for consideration of the emissions reductions achieved through the adoption of statewide programs. The guidelines must prioritize reductions in communities that have experienced disproportionate harm due to air pollution.

Commerce, in consultation with WSDOT, must also publish guidelines that specify a set of

measures counties and cities have available to them to take through updates to their comprehensive plans and development regulations that have a demonstrated ability to reduce VMT. The measures must be designed to be achievable throughout the state, including in small cities and rural cities.

Commerce must publish the full set of GHG emissions reduction and VMT reduction guidelines no later than December 31, 2025. Commerce must update the guidelines at least every four years based on the most recently available data, and must provide a process for local governments and other interested parties to submit alternative actions for possible inclusion into the guidelines at least once per year. Commerce must publish an intermediate set of guidelines no later than December 31, 2022, for use by local governments whose comprehensive plan updates are required to occur prior to December 31, 2025.

In any updates to the guidelines published after 2025, Commerce must include a determination of whether adequate progress has been made toward statewide GHG emissions reduction and VMT reduction goals. If adequate progress has not been made, Commerce must identify in the guidelines what additional measures counties and cities must take in order to make further progress.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction—Process for Adoption. Upon receipt of a proposed GHG emissions reduction subelement, Commerce must first provide notice and an opportunity for comment to all persons, groups, and agencies that have requested in writing notice of the proposed subelement. Commerce may, at its discretion, conduct a public hearing in the jurisdiction proposing the subelement. The comment period must be at least 30 days.

Within 15 days of the close of the comment period, Commerce must request the local government address the comments raised during the comment period and provide a written response as to how the proposal addresses the identified issues. Within 30 days of receiving the local government's response, Commerce must make written findings and conclusions regarding the consistency of the proposal with the requirements of the GMA and the applicable guidelines adopted by Commerce, and provide a response to the issues identified during the comment period. Commerce must either approve the GHG emissions reduction subelement as submitted, recommend specific changes, or deny the subelement in those instances in which no alteration of the GHG emissions reduction subelement appears likely to be consistent with the policy of the GMA and the applicable guidelines.

If Commerce recommends changes to the proposed GHG emissions reduction subelement, Commerce must require that the local government either agree to the proposed changes or submit an alternative GHG emissions reduction subelement.

Commerce must approve a proposed GHG emissions reduction subelement unless it determines the proposed subelement is not consistent with the policy of the GMA or the applicable guidelines.

A GHG emissions reduction subelement takes effect once approved by Commerce. Commerce must maintain a record of each GHG emissions reduction subelement, the action taken on any proposed GHG emissions reduction subelement, and any appeal of Commerce's action. Commerce's approved document of record constitutes the official GHG emissions reduction subelement.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction—Appeals. Commerce's final decision to approve or reject a proposed GHG emissions reduction subelement or amendment may be appealed to the Growth Management Hearings Board (GMHB). The GMHB's decision concerning an appeal of Commerce's final decision to approve or reject a proposed GHG emissions reduction subelement or amendment must be based solely on whether or not the adopted or amended GHG emissions reduction subelement complies with the GMA's climate change goal, the guidelines adopted by Commerce related to GHG emissions reductions and VMT reductions, or the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA).

Model Climate Change and Resiliency Element. Commerce must develop, in collaboration with the departments of Ecology, Fish and Wildlife, Natural Resources, and DOH, and the Emergency Management Division of the Washington Military Department, and adopt by rule a model climate change and resiliency element that may be used by counties, cities, and multiple-county planning regions for developing and implementing climate change and resiliency plans and policies.

Compilation of Vehicle Miles Traveled. WSDOT must compile, maintain, and publish a summary of the per capita VMT annually in each city in the state, and in the unincorporated portions of each county in the state.

Shoreline Master Program Guidelines. Ecology must update its shoreline master program guidelines to require shoreline master programs to address the impact of sea level rise and increased storm severity on people, property, and shoreline natural resources and the environment.

State Environmental Policy Act—Appeals. The adoption of ordinances, amendments to comprehensive plans, and other related nonproject actions taken by a county or city to implement the guidelines published by Commerce are not subject to appeal under the SEPA.

Comprehensive Flood Control Management Plan. A comprehensive flood control management plan, if a county chooses to adopt such a plan, must include a consideration of climate change impacts, including the impact of sea level rise and increased storm severity on people, property, natural resources, and the environment.

Growth Management Act—Definitions. "Per capita vehicle miles traveled" means the number of miles traveled using cars and light trucks in a calendar year divided by the

number of residents in Washington. The calculation of this value excludes vehicle miles driven conveying freight.

"Active transportation" means forms of pedestrian mobility including walking or running, the use of a mobility assistive device such as a wheelchair, bicycling and cycling irrespective of the number of wheels, and the use of small personal devices such as foot scooters or skateboards. Active transportation includes both traditional and electric-assist bicycles and other devices. Planning for active transportation must consider and address accommodation pursuant to the Americans with Disabilities Act and the distinct needs of each form of active transportation.

"Transportation system" means all infrastructure and services for all forms of transportation within a geographical area, irrespective of the responsible jurisdiction or transportation provider.

"Environmental justice" means the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies; with a focus on the equitable distribution of resources, benefits, and burdens in a manner that prioritizes communities that experience the greatest inequities, disproportionate impacts, and have the greatest unmet needs.

"Active transportation facilities" means facilities provided for the safety and mobility of active transportation users, including, but not limited to, trails, sidewalks, bike lanes, shared-use paths, and other facilities in the public right-of-way.

Funding. The obligation of local governments to comply with the requirements established in the amendments to the requirements of comprehensive plans under the GMA and the updated shoreline master program guidelines adopted by Ecology is contingent on the provision of state funding to local governments for the specific purpose of complying with these requirements. The obligation of local governments to comply with these requirements takes effect two years after the date the Legislature appropriates state funding to provide to local governments for complying with these requirements.

Appropriation: The bill contains a null and void clause requiring specific funding be provided in an omnibus appropriation act.

Brief Summary of Bill

- Authorizes local governments to designate tax increment financing areas and to use increased local property tax collections to fund public improvements.

SENATE COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS, FINANCIAL SERVICES & TRADE

Background: Property Tax. All real and personal property in the state is subject to property tax each year based on its value, unless specific exemption is provided by law. Property taxes are levied by the state and many local jurisdictions, including counties, cities, and local school, fire, park, and library districts. Property taxes are collected by the county and distributed to the levying jurisdiction. The county assessor determines the value of real and personal property for tax purposes, and calculates and certifies levy rates for most taxing districts. The Washington Constitution requires taxes be uniform within a class of property. The annual growth of all regular property tax levy revenue is limited as follows:

- jurisdictions with a population of less than 10,000, revenue growth is limited to 1 percent; and

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- jurisdictions with a population of 10,000 or more, revenue growth is limited to the lesser of inflation or 1 percent plus the value of new construction.

The constitution also provides for a levy rate limit of \$10 per \$1,000 of assessed value, referred to as the constitutional \$10 limit.

Tax Increment Financing. Tax increment financing (TIF) is a method of allocating a portion of property taxes to finance public improvements in designated areas. Typically, under a TIF program, a local government issues bonds to finance public improvements. To repay its bondholders, the local government is permitted to draw upon regular property tax revenue from increases in assessed value inside a special district surrounding the site of the public improvements.

Summary of Bill: The bill as referred to committee not considered.

Summary of Bill (Proposed Striking Amendment): Creation of a Tax Increment Financing Area. A local government may designate TIF areas and use resulting tax allocation revenues to pay for public improvement costs. To do so, the local government must adopt an ordinance designating a specific increment area within its boundaries. Public improvements to be financed with the use of TIF must be specified. The increment area cannot include the area of the entire jurisdiction of the local government. A local government can create no more than three active increment areas at any given time and they may not physically overlap. An increment area must be retired after no more than 25 years.

Prior to establishing an increment area, the local government must consider a project analysis that includes objectives for the increment area, identification of properties within the financing area, assessments of likely job creation and private development expected from the project, potential impacts and mitigation measures needed, and so on. If a project analysis indicates an increment area will impact at least 20 percent of assessed value in a fire district, mitigation strategies must be negotiated. Prior to adoption of an ordinance authorizing an increment area, the project analysis must be submitted to the Office of the State Treasurer for review. The local government must hold at least two public briefings for the community regarding the tax increment project.

A local government designating a TIF area may issue general obligation bonds to finance the public improvements within an increment area. Any increase in assessed value within an area is included in the add-ons for purposes of the 1 percent revenue growth limit calculation.

Apportionment of Taxes. Beginning in the calendar year following the passage of the ordinance, the county treasurer must distribute receipts from regular taxes on real property located in the increment area. Property taxes to be apportioned under TIF include property tax levies subject to the \$10 and \$5.90 limits. Taxes levied by port districts or public utility districts specifically for making payment on bonds, and taxes levied by the state for

supporting common schools are excluded from TIF apportionment.

Each taxing district shall receive that portion of its regular property taxes produced by the rate of tax levied by the taxing district on the tax allocation base value for that TIF project in the taxing district.

The local government that created the increment area shall receive an additional portion of the regular property taxes levied by each taxing district upon the increment value within the increment area. The local government that created the increment area may agree to receive less than the full amount of this portion as long as bond debt service, reserve, and other bond covenant requirements are satisfied. The portion of the tax receipts distributed to the local government may only be expended to finance public improvement costs financed by TIF.

The apportionment of increases in assessed valuation in an increment area cease when the taxing district certifies to the county assessor that allocation revenues are no longer needed to pay the public improvement costs. Any excess tax allocation revenues must be returned to the county treasurer and distributed to the taxing districts that imposed regular property taxes.

Brief History: Passed House: 3/1/21, 72-25.

Committee Activity: Agriculture, Water, Natural Resources & Parks: 3/16/21.

Brief Summary of Bill

- Directs the Department of Natural Resources to conduct analyses of the needs and opportunities related to urban forestry and provide technical assistance and capacity building resources to promote urban and community forestry.

SENATE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE, WATER, NATURAL RESOURCES & PARKS

Staff: Jeff Olsen (786-7428)

Background: The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has authority to establish a Community and Urban Forestry Program (program). Community and urban forests are identified as land within human settlements that does, or could, support trees. The program may include assistance to local governments to encourage proper tree maintenance, policy and program coordination assistance, and the provision of surplus equipment to local governments to aid urban forestry programs. As a part of the program, DNR may enter into agreements with nonprofit tree planting organizations and other entities with interests related to urban forestry. Funding can be received by DNR from the federal government or

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by gifts and grants, and DNR may charge fees for workshops and material distribution. Once received, DNR uses the funding for promoting urban and community forestry in the state.

In 2008, the Legislature directed DNR to conduct a statewide inventory of community and urban forests, to conduct an urban forest assessment, and to develop an implementation plan for the inventory and assessment of community and urban forests. The initial assessment and inventory was required to be completed no later than June 1, 2010.

Every city and county in the state has the discretionary authority to pursue recognition as an evergreen community. There can be multiple gradations of evergreen communities, and the Department of Commerce is responsible for identifying the criteria necessary for each gradation. Criteria for becoming an evergreen community includes developing a community forestry program, recognizing Arbor Day, and completing a forest inventory. The application process for becoming an evergreen community is managed through the existing DNR Tree City, U.S.A. Recognition Program.

Summary of Bill: The name of the program administered by DNR is changed from the Community and Urban Forestry Program to the Urban and Community Forestry Program. In addition to cities and counties, DNR may assist federally recognized tribes in establishing and maintaining programs in urban and community forestry. The purposes of the Urban and Community Forestry Program are expanded to include improved human health and the recovery of salmon and orcas. Lands that are designated as natural area preserves or natural resources conservation areas, or are subject to the Forest Practices Act, timber and forestland taxes, or open space, agricultural, and timberlands taxes, are not included as urban or community forest lands. An owner of private property may opt out of a program in urban and community forestry by providing written or electronic notice to the city, county, or federally recognized tribe that established the program. Several definitions are either modified or added to the Urban and Community Forestry Program law, including highly impacted community, urban and community forest, and vulnerable populations.

DNR must identify priority regions for implementation of urban forestry programs. Priority must be determined through the use and review of certain analyses and tools including:

- health disparity mapping tools that identify highly impacted communities such as the Department of Health's Washington tracking network; and
- salmon and orca recovery data including, but not limited to, the Puget Sound Partnership action agenda and other regional and statewide salmon and orca recovery plans and efforts, to target program delivery in areas where there are significant opportunities related to salmon and orca habitat and health.

DNR must conduct analyses of the needs and opportunities related to urban forestry in Washington by assessing tree canopy cover and urban forestry inventory data. DNR must also conduct a statewide inventory of urban and community forests using urban forest inventory and assessment protocols established by the United States Forest Service to

produce statistically relevant estimates of the quantity, health, composition, and benefits of urban trees and forests. Inventory data must be maintained and periodically updated.

DNR must provide technical assistance and capacity building resources and opportunities to cities, counties, federally recognized tribes, and other public and private entities in the development and coordination of policies, programs, and activities for the promotion of urban and community forestry. DNR must strive to enable urban forest managers to access carbon markets by working to ensure tools developed are compatible with existing and developing urban forest carbon market reporting protocols.

DNR may use existing tools to assist communities to develop urban forestry management plans. Management plans may include, among other elements:

- maximizing vegetated stormwater management with trees and other vegetation that reduces runoff, increases soil infiltration, and reduces stormwater pollution;
- environmental health goals specific to air quality, habitat for wildlife, and energy conservation;
- integrating disease and pest management; and
- maximizing building heating and cooling energy efficiency through appropriate siting of trees for summer shading, passive solar heating in winter, and for wind breaks.

DNR may use existing tools to assist communities to develop urban forestry ordinances. Ordinances may address elements including:

- tree canopy cover, density, and spacing;
- appropriate tree siting and maintenance for vegetation management practices and programs to prevent vegetation from interfering with or damaging utilities and public facilities;
- tree and vegetation buffers for riparian areas, critical areas, transportation and utility corridors, and commercial and residential areas; and
- variances to avoid conflicts with renewable solar energy infrastructure, passive solar building design, and locally grown produce.

DNR must encourage communities to include participation and input by vulnerable populations through community organizations and members of the public for urban and community forestry plans in the regions where they are based. DNR must ensure a minimum of 50 percent of the resources used in delivering the Urban and Community Forest Program are delivered in or within 0.25 mile of highly impacted communities.

Evergreen Communities. Statutes governing the Evergreen Communities Program are moved from Title 35, governing cities, to Title 76, governing DNR. Miscellaneous references in the Revised Code of Washington to Evergreen Communities are changed to references to urban forestry.

Appropriation: The bill contains a null and void clause requiring specific funding be provided in an omnibus appropriation act.

Brief Summary of Bill

- Requires county treasurers to grant a deferral of 2021 property tax payments for certain businesses via establishment of a payment plan.

SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS & MEANS

Background: Property Tax Statements and Payment Due Dates. All real and personal property in Washington is subject to property tax, unless the law provides a specific exemption. All taxes on real and personal property are due and payable to the county treasurer. To avoid interest and penalties, at least half of the amount owed is due by April 30th, and the full balance is due by October 31st. If the tax is less than \$50, the entire payment must be paid in full by April 30th.

Tax Delinquencies. Delinquent tax payments are subject to interest and penalties. Interest is charged at 1 percent per month on the full amount due from the month of delinquency until the delinquency is paid in full. A 3 percent penalty is also imposed on the unpaid amount of current taxes on June 1st with an additional 8 percent penalty imposed on the

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unpaid amount of current taxes as of December 1st.

Payment Options. A county treasurer may accept prepayments for current year taxes provided the payments are paid in full by the statutory tax payment due dates. A treasurer may also provide a payment agreement to a taxpayer for payment of any current or delinquent taxes owed.

Summary of Bill: County treasurers must grant a deferral of taxes due in 2021 via the establishment of a payment plan for qualifying businesses. To qualify, a business must demonstrate a loss of at least 25 percent of revenue for calendar year 2020 compared to calendar year 2019. A deferral must be requested from the county treasurer on forms developed by the Department of Revenue. Penalties and interest are not be applied to taxes due under the deferral payment plan so long as the terms of the payment plan are fully met.

An owner of real property receiving a deferral must pass on the entire benefit to a tenant or sublessee if the tenant or sublessee is required by the lease or other contract to pay the property tax expense of the owner.

Brief Summary of Bill

- Extends until December 31, 2054, the expiration of the local sales and use tax for public facilities in rural counties for those counties imposing the tax prior to August 1, 2009, at the maximum rate.

Background: Retail Sales and Use Tax. Retail sales taxes are imposed on retail sales of most articles of tangible personal property, digital products, and some services. A retail sale is a sale to the final consumer or end user of the property, digital product, or service. If retail sales taxes were not collected when the user acquired the property, digital products, or services, then use tax applies to the value of property, digital product, or service when used in this state. The state, all counties, and all cities levy retail sales and use taxes. The state sales and use tax rate is 6.5 percent. Local sales and use tax rates vary from 0.5 percent to 3.9 percent, depending on the location.

This analysis was prepared by non-partisan legislative staff for the use of legislative members in their deliberations. This analysis is not part of the legislation nor does it constitute a statement of legislative intent.

Local Sales and Use Tax for Public Facilities in Rural Counties. Rural counties may impose a 0.09 percent sales and use tax (rural public facility tax), credited against the state rate, to fund certain public facilities and economic development activities. For the rural public facility tax, a rural county is a county with a population density less than 100 persons per square mile, or a county smaller than 225 square miles, as determined by the Office of Financial Management (OFM). Revenues collected from the rural public facility tax must be used to finance public facilities serving economic development purposes in rural counties and to finance personnel in economic development offices. Public facilities generally include telecommunications infrastructure, transportation infrastructure, commercial infrastructure, some utilities infrastructure, and other specifically identified facilities. A public facility must be listed as an item in the officially adopted county overall economic development plan; the economic development section of the county's comprehensive plan; or the comprehensive plan of a city or town located within the county, for those counties planning under the Growth Management Act.

Counties must consult with cities, towns, and port districts within the county and with the associate development organization serving the county to ensure expenditures meet the goals of the rural public facility tax. Counties must annually report to the Office of the State Auditor a list of projects implemented and expenditures made using revenues from the rural public facility tax.

For counties imposing the rural public facility tax at 0.09 percent prior to August 1, 2009, the tax expires 25 years after the tax was first imposed.

Summary of Bill: For counties imposing the rural public facility tax at 0.09 percent prior to August 1, 2009, and that met the definition of a rural county as of August 1, 2009, the tax expires December 31, 2054.

The determination of which counties qualify as a rural county must be made based on OFM population data.

Background:

Washington Law Against Discrimination.

The Washington Law Against Discrimination (WLAD) prohibits discriminatory practices in employment; places of public resort, accommodation, or amusement; real estate transactions; and credit and insurance. The law protects persons from discrimination based on their race, creed, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, families with children, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, age, honorably discharged veterans, or military status. The law also protects persons from discrimination based on the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability.

The WLAD declares void any provision in a written instrument relating to real property that purports to forbid or restrict the conveyance, encumbrance, occupancy, or lease of the property to individuals within a protected class. If a written instrument contains a provision void under the WLAD, the owner, occupant, or tenant of the property or the homeowners' association board may bring an action in superior court to have the provision struck from

the public records, or may record a restrictive covenant modification document with the county auditor.

Seller's Disclosures.

A seller of residential real property must provide a buyer with a disclosure statement about the property within five business days after mutual acceptance of a written purchase agreement. The disclosure statement requires the seller to answer (1) "yes," (2) "no," or (3) "don't know" on a list of items, with space provided for more information if necessary. The seller disclosure statement includes the following categories:

- title;
- water;
- sewer or on-site sewage system;
- structural;
- systems and fixtures;
- homeowners' association or common interests;
- environmental;
- manufactured and mobile homes; and
- full disclosure by sellers.

Within three business days of receipt of the disclosure statement, the buyer may approve and accept the disclosure statement or rescind the purchase agreement. If the disclosure statement is delivered late or not delivered, the buyer's right to rescind expires the earlier of three days after receipt of the disclosure statement or the date the transfer closes.

Summary of Engrossed Second Substitute Bill:

Subject to appropriations, the University of Washington and Eastern Washington University must review existing recorded covenants and deed restrictions to identify recorded documents that include racial or other restrictions on property ownership or use against protected classes that are unlawful under the WLAD. For properties subject to such unlawful restrictions, the universities must notify property owners and the county auditor of the county in which the property is located and must provide information on how such unlawful restrictions may be struck.

The seller disclosure statement is amended to include a notice to the buyer that covenants or deed restrictions based on race, creed, sexual orientation, or other protected class are void and unenforceable, and provides information on how such illegal restrictions can be struck.

A process for striking and removing unlawful restrictions from the record and chain of title after a property owner files an action in superior court is provided.

The original document containing the unlawful restrictions may be preserved for historical or archival purposes.

The provisions of the bill apply to real estate transactions entered into on or after January 1, 2022.

Fiscal Note: Available.

Effective Date: The bill takes effect 90 days after adjournment of the session in which the bill is passed.

Staff Summary of Public Testimony (Local Government):

(In support) The use of racial covenants or deed restrictions to prevent ownership of property are some of the most explicit examples of racism that we have had in our housing system. They have been ruled unconstitutional but still exist on many titles and are very offensive. The Legislature created an administrative process to allow homeowners to file a document to repudiate the racial covenants without the need to use an attorney, however, most property owners will never know if their property has a racial covenant. If property owners knew, they would likely be deeply troubled, and the bill is trying to address that by providing a review of existing records and documents where these restrictions exist and notify owners so they can have the provisions stricken and removed. Diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts are a priority of Washington realtors, and Washington is a leader in diversity, equity, and inclusion. Living with restrictive covenants has led to racism and obstacles to education, food, and jobs, and has manifested in ways that hold people back. Offensive language in deeds still exists today, and it's unimaginable how it has made people feel. The language is a legacy of the racist past, serves no purpose today, and is unenforceable. There has been a long history of discrimination in real estate, and the industry is currently going through a reckoning with gaining awareness of this activity. People have come to realize that this issue will not be addressed with a silver-bullet solution and will require a long-term effort. The bill focuses on raising awareness of this racist history. Many states, like Washington, have an existing process for removing restrictive language, but many people are not aware of the language in property records. There is a need for a statewide process to bring this information forward.

(Opposed) None.

(Other) There is no opposition to the goal of the bill. Racially discriminatory covenants are an ugly piece of history that should be rectified. These covenants are not enforceable, and there is already an existing process to remove them that was put in place in 2018. This existing process has not had time to work yet. There is an advertisement problem because people do not know about the existing program. The task that would be given to counties in this bill is daunting. Many of the deeds and covenants are old, hand-written documents that must be fished through and read one at a time. The funding in the bill just loosens what existing revenue can be used for, it does not provide additional funding. There are also

concerns about Growth Management Act implications. Maybe the solution is a combination advertising the existing process and having a process that is less onerous. It is heartening to hear talk about shared responsibility for creating this racist history. Cities have a very large difference of populations and this bill would require a considerable use of staff time and pull staff away from their comprehensive plan duties. The timing in the bill requires it to be done before the comprehensive plan, and there is no provision on what happens if something is missed.

Staff Summary of Public Testimony (Appropriations):

(In support) The building industry and realtors support this bill, as it will help address a historical wrong. Legislation passed previously sets out a process for removing potentially discriminatory covenants and restrictions from recorded documents. Identifying these discriminatory covenants and alerting current property owners makes the process more proactive. Realtors would support an amendment to require the notice of potentially discriminatory covenants as part of the existing seller disclosure form.

There is a current collaboration between historians and Gonzaga University to help property owners identify these covenants and access the existing legal remedy to remove them. Including college students in assisting with the outreach program is supported. There have been legal conflicts around implementing large-scale, blanket removals of discriminatory restrictions from recorded documents, and a case is currently pending on this subject. An amendment to strengthen the current legal remedy is supported.

(Opposed) None.

(Other) County auditors contributed to the legislation that established the current legal remedy to remove discriminatory covenants. County auditors support a state-funded program where institutions of higher education will conduct outreach to inform property owners of the legal remedy. Institutions of higher education employ trained individuals who are better able to identify and verify potentially discriminatory covenants than county employees, and who will be more effective than counties. County auditors look forward to working with institutions of higher education to provide access to records to enable this process.

SENATE BILL REPORT

EHB 1386

As of March 15, 2021

Title: An act relating to modifying the property tax exemption for the value of new construction of industrial/manufacturing facilities in targeted urban areas.

Brief Description: Modifying the property tax exemption for the value of new construction of industrial/manufacturing facilities in targeted urban areas.

Sponsors: Representatives Wicks, Dolan, Lovick, Sells, Berg and Hackney.

Brief History: Passed House: 3/2/21, 97-0.

Committee Activity: Ways & Means: 3/15/21.

Brief Summary of Bill

- Expands eligibility for the targeted urban area property tax exemption (TUA exemption) to allow any city or town to use the program.
- Expands eligible facilities for the TUA exemption to include those facilities categorized with a transportation use.
- Specifies certain labor specifications that must be given priority by a city when evaluating applications for a TUA exemption.
- Increases the average wage required for a family living wage job to \$23 and requires that health care benefits be provided for the TUA exemption.
- Modifies several administrative provisions related to the TUA exemption.
- Extends, until December 30, 2030, the deadline to apply for a TUA exemption.

Background: Property Tax. All property is subject to a tax each year based on the highest and best use, unless a specific exemption is provided by law. The county assessor determines assessed value for each property and calculates property taxes. The property tax bill for an individual property is determined by multiplying the assessed value of the property by the tax rate for each taxing district in which the property is located. The aggregate of all regular tax levies upon real and personal property by the state and all taxing districts may not exceed 1 percent of the true and fair value of the property. The aggregate regular levies of junior taxing districts and senior taxing districts, other than the state, may not exceed \$5.90 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

Targeted Urban Area Property Tax Exemption. Certain cities are authorized to grant a 10-year local property tax exemption for new industrial or manufacturing facilities in designated areas. To be eligible, a city must be located in a county with a population between 700,000 and 800,000; have a population of at least 18,000; and be located north or east of the largest city in the county.

Industrial or manufacturing facilities must be at least 10,000 square feet with an improvement value of at least \$800,000 and be categorized as a manufacturing use by the United States Department of Labor. New construction of industrial or manufacturing facilities must:

- be within a targeted area designated by the city;
- be on land that has no existing building improvements and is zoned for an industrial or manufacturing use as of December 31, 2014;
- meet all construction and development regulations of the city; and
- be completed within three years from the date of approval of the application.

Within one year of building occupancy, the facility must create at least 25 family living wage jobs with an average wage of at least \$18 per hour.

A property owner seeking the exemption must apply to the city, pay any applicable fees, and contract with the city agreeing to terms and conditions of the implementation of the development. An application must be approved by a city governing authority or its authorized representative. The contract must be approved by the city governing authority, or an administrative official or commission authorized by the governing authority. No application may be submitted on or after December 31, 2022.

The value of the property tax exemption is provided on the value of eligible improvements and applies only to the city portion of the property tax. A county may, by resolution, allow any property receiving an exemption from city property taxes to also receive an exemption from county property taxes.

If exempted improvements are converted to another use or do not continue to satisfy all

conditions of the exemption, the exemption must be canceled and an additional tax must be imposed on the property equal to the amount that was exempted, but for which program requirements were not met. The amount due is subject to interest, calculated from the date when the tax would have otherwise been due, and a penalty equal to 20 percent of the additional tax imposed.

Summary of Bill: Any city or town is eligible to use the targeted urban area property tax exemption.

A family living wage job must have an average wage of \$23 per hour and offer health care benefits.

Facilities categorized as Division E: Transportation—major groups 40-42, 45, or 47-48—by the United States Department of Labor are eligible for the exemption. Cities may limit eligible facilities to exclude Division E: Transportation categorizations.

When evaluating applications, a city must give priority to those applicants that:

- compensate workers at prevailing wage;
- procure from, and contract with, women, minority, or veteran-owned businesses;
- procure from, and contract with, entities with a history of compliance with wage and hour regulations;
- include apprenticeship utilization from state-registered apprenticeship programs;
- provide for preferred entry for workers living in the vicinity of the project; and
- maintain labor standards for workers employed at the facility.

An application for exemption must be reviewed and approved by a city governing authority. The contract into which an applicant must enter with the city must be approved by the city governing authority.

If a project fails to maintain 25 family living wage jobs, the exemption must be canceled and an additional tax must be imposed on the property equal to the amount that was exempted, but for which program requirements were not met, beginning from when the facility last maintained a minimum of at least 25 family living wage jobs.

No application for exemption may be submitted on or after December 31, 2030.

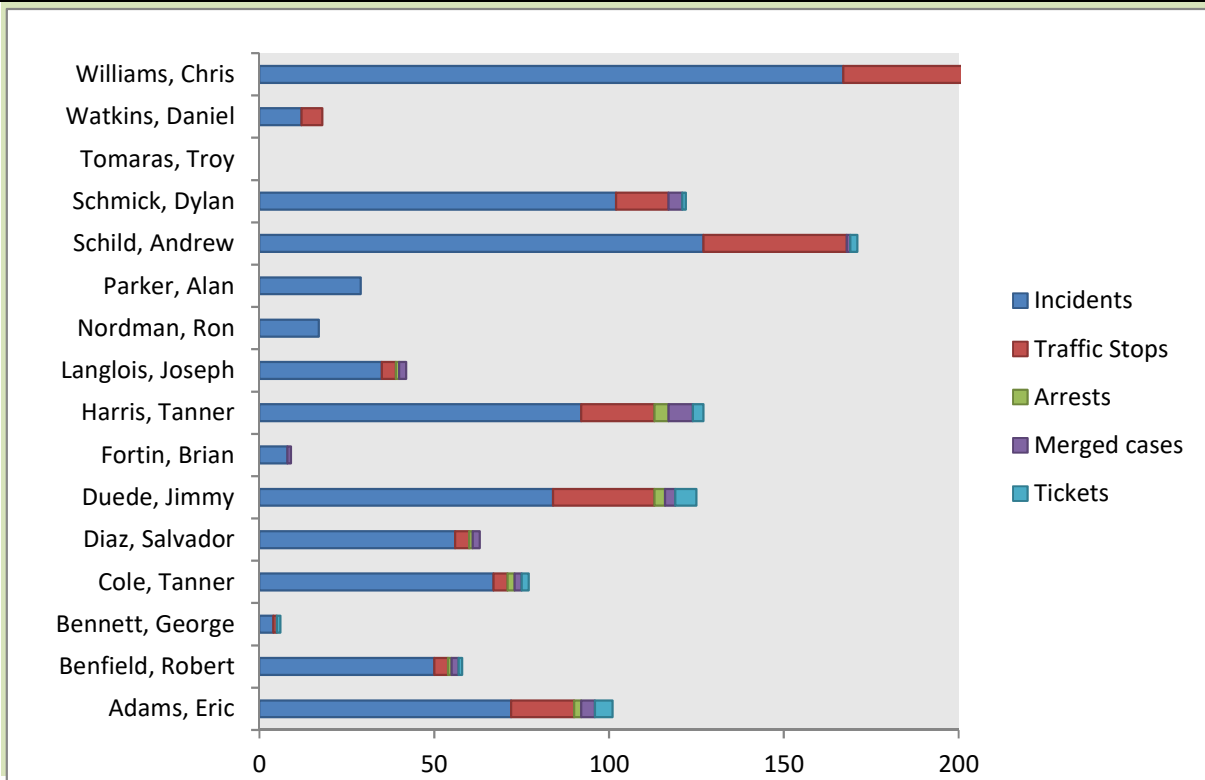

WASTEWATER TREATMENT

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WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: GENERAL

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES:

- Treated approximately 30.4 million gallons of sewage (1.084 million gallons per day) removing over 98 % of Biochemical Oxygen Demand and 97 % Total Suspended Solids. Influent flow increased by 97,000 gallons per day from January's flow.
- The plant discharged the plant effluent flow to the creek.
- Submitted to the Washington State Department of Ecology (DOE)
 - January 2021 Monthly Discharge Monitoring Report
 - Submitted Annual Biosolids Report

- Submitted Annual Biosolids Report to EPA
- The wastewater treatment plant exceeded the permit limit for total coliform one day.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: MAINTENANCE

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES:

Issues Repaired

- Replaced all the paddles on the Brown Bear which is used to aerate and turn the solids on the drying bed and hard surfaced the blade edges.

Issues that need addressed

- SBR 1 mixer float needs replaced. The replacement float is on site and ready. Scheduling a crane for the installation. Safe installation requires favorable weather conditions.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: OPERATIONS

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES:

- The plant discharged the effluent flow in February. Plant effluent discharged to the creek did not require cooling or aerating to meet the November through April NPDES permit conditions.
- Dewatering process solids and distributing on the drying pad for further processing
- The plant used an average 6,289 kilowatt hours per day of electricity to operate costing \$429 per day. The average usage since 2016 has been 6,872 kilowatt hours per day.
- The older biosolids on the drying bed were re-rowed into bigger piles to make more room on the drying bed for more biosolids processing.
- Changes were made to the Sequential Batch Reactor (SBR) and Disk Filtration processes due to solids loss from the SBRs at the end of the month.
- Snow was plowed from the plant roads following the February snow storm

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: LABORATORY

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES:

- All daily, weekly, and monthly regulatory testing performed as required
- All quarterly sampling was completed.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: COLLECTIONS

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES:

- The city received a call for a possible sewer back-up at 717 SE 6th Street. No issues were found upon inspection.
- City received a call concerning the sewer line in the alley behind 409 SE 4th. Checked the upstream and downstream manholes and found no signs of sewer blockage.
- Cleaned 1007-feet of sewer lines in the alley behind 409 SE 4th as a follow up to previous days sewer complaint call as a precaution
- Sewage lift stations checked and maintained weekly
- Alarm dialers status for the lift stations checked every work day

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: EFFLUENT LAND APPLICATION SITE

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES:

- Land treatment of the effluent ended for the season on October 7, 2020.
- Clean up activities were performed at the site of harvested Hybrid Poplar trees (28-acres). Manual ground clean-up of tree harvest debris was started but snow brought the effort to a halt. The picture is of one of worst areas in the field. The clean-up must be completed before a crop can be planted.



WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT: JACOBS FLEET STATUS

- Equipment not received to date
 - Trailer mounted generator
