Discussion: 3.01 Neighborhood Outreach

Mr. Rizzitiello introduced Ms. Olivia Lipson, Whitman Fellow to the Commission. He informed she is working on a Neighborhood Outreach program with many cities similar to College Place to engage neighborhoods. She is working to try to create activities that are COVID-19 safe and for after COVID-19 to encourage community engagement. Ms. Lipson informed she is looking for suggestions or information related to kid programs, outdoor programs and general community engagement. Discussion ensued. The commission will think on this and come back with suggestions or ideas at the next meeting.

Discussion: 3.02 Light Up the Avenue Update

Mr. Rizzitiello communicated that the annual Winterfest event was canceled due to COVID-19. Light Up the Avenue event was suggested by several other Commission's and so the City started the process to move forward with planning the event. The idea for the event is to grow each year and eventually end up with holiday display lights in Lion's Park after it is renovated. The City and several sponsors have funded the event this year by purchasing snowflakes for College Avenue and several other light displays that will be put up on the campus. Thursday, December 3, 2020, at 5:30 PM we will kick off by a virtual tree and display lighting, 6:00 PM a small city vehicle parade around College Place will commence guest starring Santa on the Fire Truck, and the event will end with a fireworks display at 7:30 PM from an unknown location.

Discussion: 3.03 Library Status

Mr. Rizzitiello communicated in August 2019, College Place citizens voted to annex into the Walla Walla Rural Library District. A temporary library branch was established at Meadowbrook Plaza, then COVID-19 hit and it ended up being closed for a while. The library branch is now open by appointment for 20 minute time slots. There are tours on YouTube to see the inside.

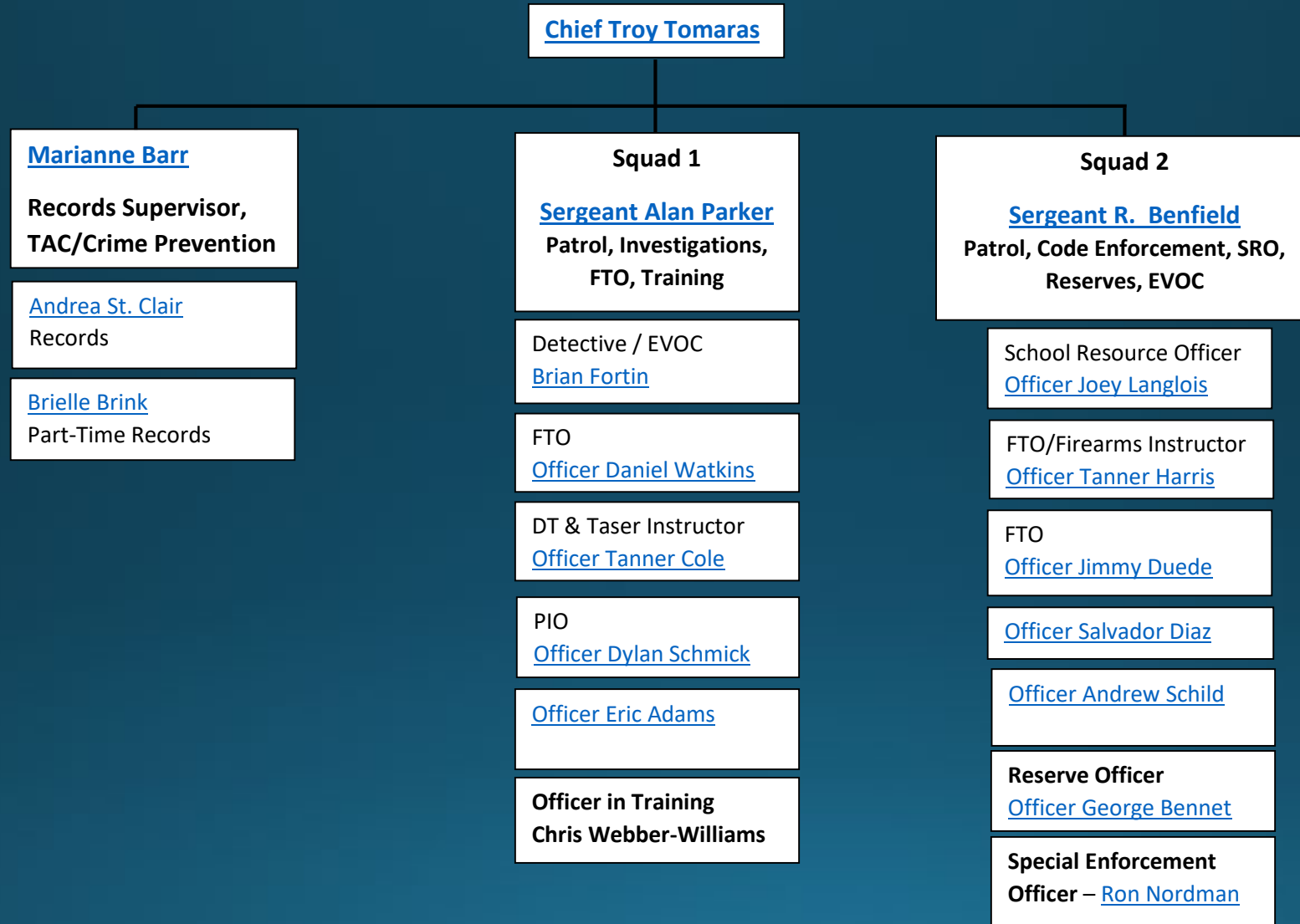

# Accreditation



- The College Place Police Department is a fully accredited agency through the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC).
- CPPD received full accreditation in June for the first time in our 75 year history.
- The purpose of law enforcement agency accreditation is to professionalize the law enforcement industry by providing a review process for agencies to be certified as operating under industry best practices and standards.

# Federally Certified LE Agency

- On January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2021 the CPPD became a Federally Certified LE Agency by meeting the requirements of Presidential Order 13929, “Safe Policing for Safe Communities”.
  - CPPD is an accredited law enforcement agency through WASPC.
  - CPPD use-of-force policies adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws;
  - CPPD maintains use-of-force policies that prohibit the use of choke holds, except in situations where the use of deadly force is allowed by law.

# 8 Can't Wait

- **1 – Ban Chokeholds & Strangleholds**

- The CPPD does not use chokeholds or strangleholds. We do train our officers to use the Vascular Neck Restraint (VNR). VNR does not restrict oxygen to the brain. VNR is a less lethal option for our officers when dealing with a combative individual.
- The CPPD has never had a use of force utilizing the VNR.

- **2. Require De-escalation**

- CPPD officers are trained in de-escalation techniques. CPPD has a CJTC certified de-escalation instructor (Officer Schmick). Each officer is required by law to attend a minimum of 40 hours of de-escalation training every three years (I-940)
- Officers are also required to complete annual Crisis Intervention Training.

# 8 Can't Wait

- **3. Require warning shots before shooting**

- CPPD Policy 300.5 states in part “a verbal warning should precede the use of deadly force, where feasible”. We do not use warning shots. We have to be accountable for every round from our weapon.

- **4. Requires Exhaust All Alternatives before Shooting**

- CPPD officers are trained to exhaust all alternatives before shooting.
- CPPD officers have less lethal tools such as Taser, ASP baton, Less Lethal Shotgun beanbag rounds and Vascular Neck Restraint. We have also ordered 40 mm less lethal impact munitions for the supervisors.

- **5. Duty to Intervene**

- CPPD does have a policy to Intervene/intercede
- Policy 300.2.1 states in part; “any officer present and observing another officer using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force.

# 8 Can't wait

- **6. Ban shooting at moving vehicles**

- CPPD policy does not ban shooting at moving vehicles. HOWEVER....we recognize and train that this is a last alternative.
- CPPD Policy 300.5.1
  - Shots fired at or from a moving vehicle are rarely effective. Officers should move out of the path of an approaching vehicle instead of discharging their firearm at the vehicle or any of its occupants. An officer should only discharge a firearm at a moving vehicle or its occupants when the officer reasonably believes there are no other reasonable means available to avert the threat of the vehicle, or if deadly force other than the vehicle is directed at the officer or others.

# 8 Can't wait

- **7. Required use of force continuum.**
- A use of force continuum is NOT best practice. A continuum is often used to train new officers to help describe the continuum of force. The idea starts with officer presence at the bottom, then increases with passive resistance, active resistance, assaultive and finally deadly force at the top.
- Why is it no longer used? An officer may be immediately confronted with a lethal encounter upon contact. We do however discuss and train to recognize each level presented within a continuum and how to appropriately respond with the least amount of force necessary to gain compliance.
- The CPPD invests heavily in the training of our officers. CPPD officers recorded 4,653 hours of training in 2019. That is an average of 332 hours per officer. CPPD far exceeds the State required 24 hours of ongoing training per officer.

# 8 Can't wait

- **8. Require Comprehensive Reporting**

- The CPPD does require comprehensive reporting. This is a requirement of our accreditation and best practice.
- Officers are required to notify a supervisor when force is used. If a detainee is injured, officers are trained to provide first aid, call EMS and/or take to hospital for examination.
- Officers are required to submit a detailed report.
- Supervisors are required to conduct an investigation into the use of force and document within a use of force report.
- If there is a policy violation, an internal investigation is conducted.
- Use of Force is closely monitored.

# Bias-Based / Racial Profiling Report

- Bias-based policing is described as the inappropriate reliance on characteristics such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age cultural group, disability or affiliation with any non-criminal group as the basis for providing differing law enforcement service or enforcement.
- RCW [43.101.410](#)
- Racial profiling—Policies—Training—Complaint review process—Data collection and reporting.
- Adopt a written policy
- Review/audit practices , Procedures & Training
- Continue training on racial profiling
- Work with minority groups to address issue of racial profiling
- Collect demographic data on traffic stops and analyze data

# Bias-Based Policing

- **402.2 POLICY**

- The College Place Police Department is committed to providing law enforcement services to the community with due regard for the racial, cultural or other differences of those served. It is the policy of this department to provide law enforcement services and to enforce the law equally, fairly, objectively and without discrimination toward any individual or group

- **402.5 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES**

- Supervisors shall monitor those individuals under their command for any behavior that may conflict with the purpose of this policy and shall handle any alleged or observed violation of this policy in accordance with the Personnel Complaints Policy.
- Supervisors shall discuss any issues with the involved officer and his/her supervisor in a timely manner.
- Supervisors shall periodically review MAV recordings, MDT data and any other available resource used to document contact between officers and the public to ensure compliance with this policy.
  - Supervisors shall document these periodic reviews.
  - Recordings that capture a potential instance of racial- or bias-based profiling shall be appropriately retained for administrative investigation purposes.
- Supervisors shall initiate investigations of any actual or alleged violations of this policy.
- Supervisors should ensure that no retaliatory action is taken against any member of this department who discloses information concerning racial- or bias-based profiling

- Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion Program
- Qualifications - Low level misdemeanor crimes, or referrals.
  - Medical help, drug treatment,
  - Case managers assigned to individuals.
  - Accountability

# Waypoint – CRT

- We partner with a Crisis Response Team. Their facility “Waypoint” is located in College Place. They have a 16 bed facility to help individuals struggling with mental health.
- Waypoint is a voluntary facility.
- Walla Walla Crisis Response Team members respond to assist officers when confronted with mental health issues.

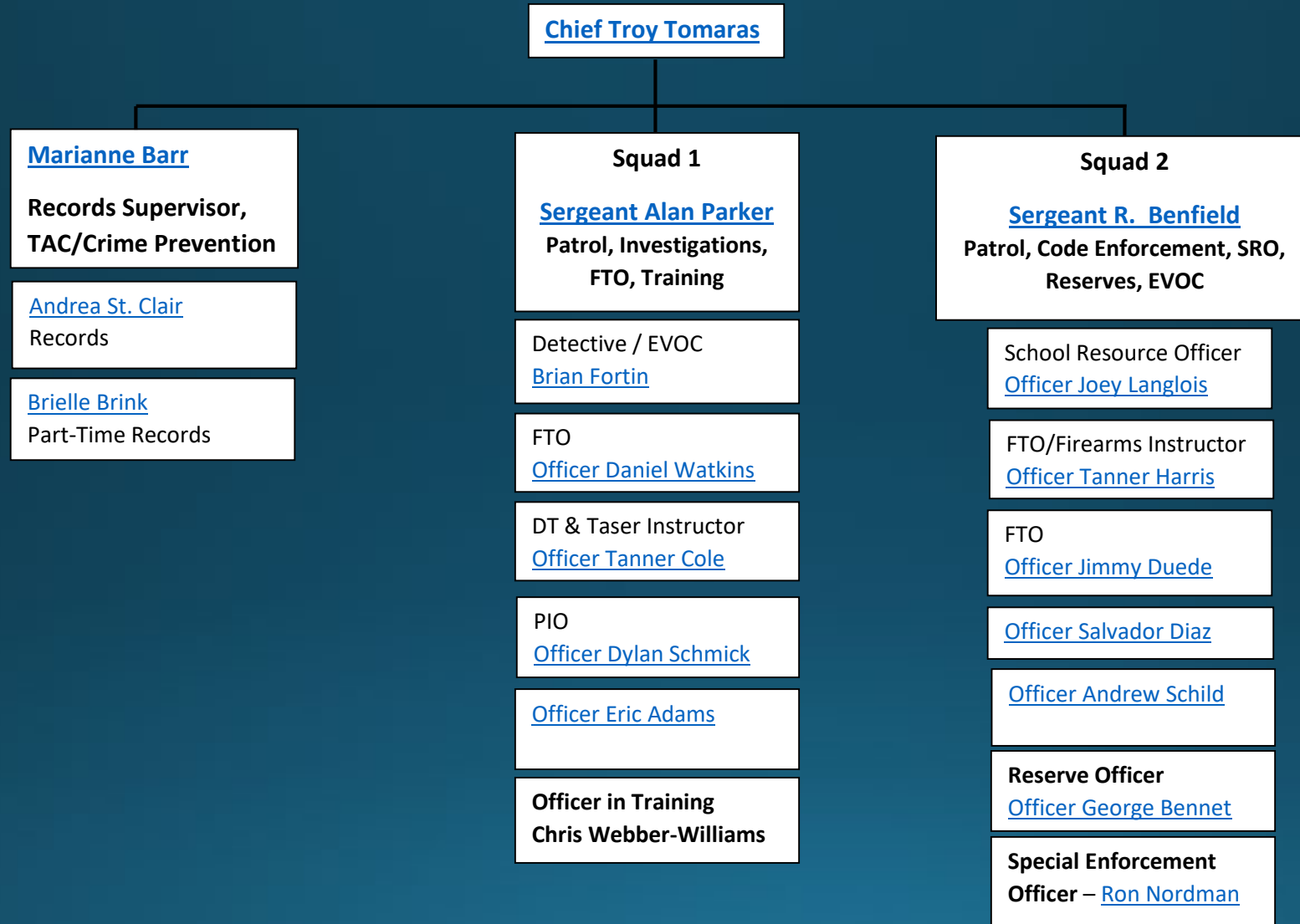

- CPPD officers have less lethal tools such as Taser, ASP baton, Less Lethal Shotgun beanbag rounds and Vascular Neck Restraint. We have also ordered 40 mm less lethal impact munitions for the supervisors.

- **5. Duty to Intervene**

- CPPD does have a policy to Intervene/intercede
- Policy 300.2.1 states in part; “any officer present and observing another officer using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force.

# 8 Can't wait

- **6. Ban shooting at moving vehicles**

- CPPD policy does not ban shooting at moving vehicles. HOWEVER....we recognize and train that this is a last alternative.
- CPPD Policy 300.5.1
  - Shots fired at or from a moving vehicle are rarely effective. Officers should move out of the path of an approaching vehicle instead of discharging their firearm at the vehicle or any of its occupants. An officer should only discharge a firearm at a moving vehicle or its occupants when the officer reasonably believes there are no other reasonable means available to avert the threat of the vehicle, or if deadly force other than the vehicle is directed at the officer or others.

# 8 Can't wait

- **7. Required use of force continuum.**
- A use of force continuum is NOT best practice. A continuum is often used to train new officers to help describe the continuum of force. The idea starts with officer presence at the bottom, then increases with passive resistance, active resistance, assaultive and finally deadly force at the top.
- Why is it no longer used? An officer may be immediately confronted with a lethal encounter upon contact. We do however discuss and train to recognize each level presented within a continuum and how to appropriately respond with the least amount of force necessary to gain compliance.
- The CPPD invests heavily in the training of our officers. CPPD officers recorded 4,653 hours of training in 2019. That is an average of 332 hours per officer. CPPD far exceeds the State required 24 hours of ongoing training per officer.

# 8 Can't wait

- **8. Require Comprehensive Reporting**

- The CPPD does require comprehensive reporting. This is a requirement of our accreditation and best practice.
- Officers are required to notify a supervisor when force is used. If a detainee is injured, officers are trained to provide first aid, call EMS and/or take to hospital for examination.
- Officers are required to submit a detailed report.
- Supervisors are required to conduct an investigation into the use of force and document within a use of force report.
- If there is a policy violation, an internal investigation is conducted.
- Use of Force is closely monitored.

# Bias-Based / Racial Profiling Report

- Bias-based policing is described as the inappropriate reliance on characteristics such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age cultural group, disability or affiliation with any non-criminal group as the basis for providing differing law enforcement service or enforcement.
- RCW [43.101.410](#)
- Racial profiling—Policies—Training—Complaint review process—Data collection and reporting.
- Adopt a written policy
- Review/audit practices , Procedures & Training
- Continue training on racial profiling
- Work with minority groups to address issue of racial profiling
- Collect demographic data on traffic stops and analyze data

# Bias-Based Policing

- **402.2 POLICY**

- The College Place Police Department is committed to providing law enforcement services to the community with due regard for the racial, cultural or other differences of those served. It is the policy of this department to provide law enforcement services and to enforce the law equally, fairly, objectively and without discrimination toward any individual or group

- **402.5 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES**

- Supervisors shall monitor those individuals under their command for any behavior that may conflict with the purpose of this policy and shall handle any alleged or observed violation of this policy in accordance with the Personnel Complaints Policy.
- Supervisors shall discuss any issues with the involved officer and his/her supervisor in a timely manner.
- Supervisors shall periodically review MAV recordings, MDT data and any other available resource used to document contact between officers and the public to ensure compliance with this policy.
  - Supervisors shall document these periodic reviews.
  - Recordings that capture a potential instance of racial- or bias-based profiling shall be appropriately retained for administrative investigation purposes.
- Supervisors shall initiate investigations of any actual or alleged violations of this policy.
- Supervisors should ensure that no retaliatory action is taken against any member of this department who discloses information concerning racial- or bias-based profiling

# LEAD -

- Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion Program
- Qualifications - Low level misdemeanor crimes, or referrals.
  - Medical help, drug treatment,
  - Case managers assigned to individuals.
  - Accountability

# Waypoint – CRT

- We partner with a Crisis Response Team. Their facility “Waypoint” is located in College Place. They have a 16 bed facility to help individuals struggling with mental health.
- Waypoint is a voluntary facility.
- Walla Walla Crisis Response Team members respond to assist officers when confronted with mental health issues.
